# MANY GOING TO STEAM SHOVEL TRIAL ARRIVES

## CASE OF SCRIBER TAKES LOCALS TO FEDERAL COURT.

Passenger Trains Will be Loaded to their Capacity Tonight

The trial of Jeff Scriber, who is charged with forgeries and irregularities while conducting a bank at La Grande, which begins Monday in Portland, is taking a large number of La Grande citizens to the metropolis.

The exodus will start this evening when the first delegation will leave. One car has been organized and the following men will occupy it: J. B. Thomson, Walter Neldner, Dr. Mollitor, T. J. Scroggin, C. D. Goodnough, W. B. Sargent, J. H. Pearce, S. N. Bolton, H. C. Rinehart, Fred Gaakill, W. M. Seigrist, George Good, Dick Smith, Lee Smith and G. E. Fowler. The car will leave this evening attached to passenger train No. 5.

No one offers a guess as to the outcome of the trial to begin Monday. It is understood that United States Attorney John McCourt has worked hard on details and that the government will present its case in the strongest possible light.

On the other hand, Scriber's friends have hopes of some new development that will throw new light on the entire transaction.

## SECOND GREAT DIRT MOVER PUT TO WORK ON RAILROAD

Work of Contractors is to be Greatly Facilitated by the Use of Steam Shovels and Other Modern Machinery that Take the Place of Many Men—Labor Question a Hard One at Present.

The second big steam shovel to be used by Twohy Brothers in rebuilding the O. R. & N. between this city and Yoakum arrived from Portland and was taken to the scene of activity, says a Pendleton paper. One of the big dirt digging machines has been engaged for several days in the task of changing the channel of the river, just below the Pilot Rock Junction.

Still another machine is due to arrive in a day or two. That is used by the government in constructing the big reservoir and dam on the Umatilla project. The Twohy Brothers have purchased the entire equipment of the government, with the exception of the steam shovel, and it is now being rushed to this point. The equipment consists of the steam shovel and the construction trains. Other dump cars and dinky engines are arriving almost daily from the east and the work is getting into full swing.

In the absence of any regular telephone connections with Pendleton from that section of the country, Twohy Brothers have erected a line of their own which is now in operation. It is probable that with the termination of the contract that this line will be turned over to the farmers living along the river. Some of these have been trying for several years to get telephone connections with Pendleton, but owing to the fact that their farms are few and far apart they have been unable to construct a line of their own and the telephone company has not found it profitable to do so. With the line already up the farmers can easily afford to maintain it.

The shovel which arrived last is a 70 ton Bucyrus, one of the largest made. The one already at work is a 60 ton.

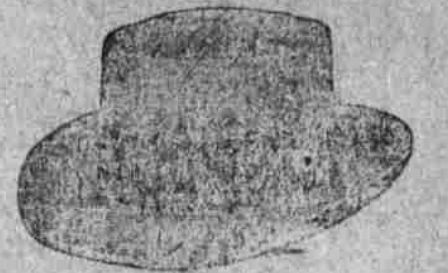

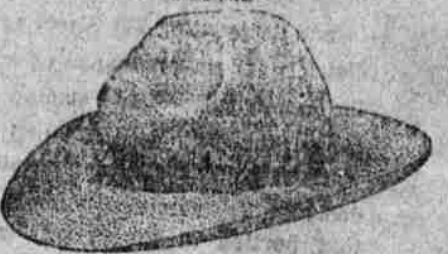

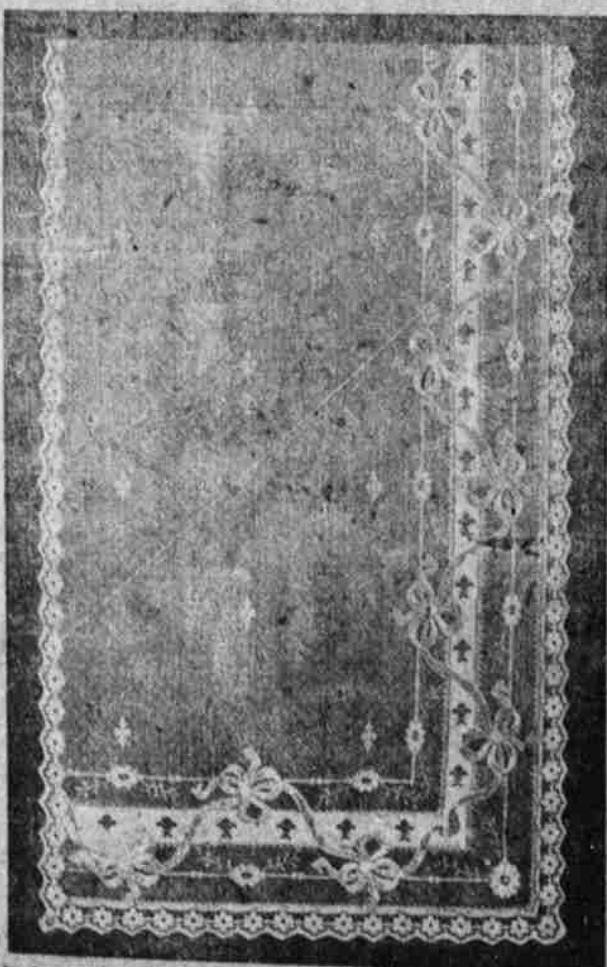
