While the defendant would seem to contemplate admitting most of the charges made against him, a stiff technical opposition is being put up during progress of the trial. Numerous objections were entered this forenoon to procedure and exceptions saved, indicating that an adverse issue would not be permitted to repose in the lower tribunal.
