MEDALS COME SQUATTER IS THE LOSER FOR MEET

DAY WILL BE GATHERING FOR MANY FANS.
Everything Points to a Large Attendance and Very Successful Meet.

Medals for winners of places in the Eastern Oregon track and field meet which will be held on the vacant block in the rear of the high school building next Saturday, have arrived and local athletes who have seen them are itching for the honor of carrying them off. They are very beautiful, of heavy material and are better by far than any medal ever given out in an Eastern Oregon meet in recent years.
The local squad of athletes is resting up from its arduous job of last Saturday and hopes to be in fine fettle for the contest next Saturday. It is evident that about 20 or 25 points will take the meet and the locals are prepared to "grab" all they can even in seconds and thirds.
Much interest is also manifested locally and a large attendance is thought assured, for each of the visiting teams will bring delegates in good numbers.

COMMISSIONER OF GENERAL LAND OFFICE REVERSES.
Helen Jellison of this City, Wins Choice Tract in Wallowa.

By a decision of the commissioner of the general land office, Helen Jellison, of this city, wins her case against Harvey R. Bursell, of Wallowa, Oregon, involving 160 acres of choice timber lands in Wallowa county. The former claimed the land as a timber claim and Bursell claimed to have settled on the land about one year before the township was opened for filing. The local office, in passing on the mass of contradictory testimony taken before them, evidently believed the witnesses for Bursell, while the commissioner sets out all the testimony produced and shows that the preponderance of the testimony is with Mrs. Jellison, according to the view taken in his office.
O. M. Corkins of Enterprise, represented Bursell and Jno. S. Hodgkin, of La Grande, represented Mrs. Jellison.

WINDSTORM IN SANTA ROSA COUNTY IS COSTLY.
Nine Killed and Great Amount of Damage Done in Brief 24 Hours.

Santa Rosa, Calif., May 17.—A summary of the damage done in Sonoma county by the windstorms the past 24 hours, ending early this morning, shows one death and three fires at a loss of thousands to ranchers, and unroofing of several buildings. Mrs. G. Poloni was electrocuted by a falling electric wire.
