Postmaster General Hitchcock has amended that section of the postal regulations relating to the transmission of infectious matter in the mails. The change in the regulations will permit the use of a less expensive but amply secure mailing case for specimens of disease. It will provide also that such material may be sent to private laboratories approved by the postoffice department at Washington, as well as to government, state and municipal laboratories. The changes meet with the approval of the bureau of public health and marine hospital service.

I'D RATHER MARRY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES THAN BE PRESIDENT.

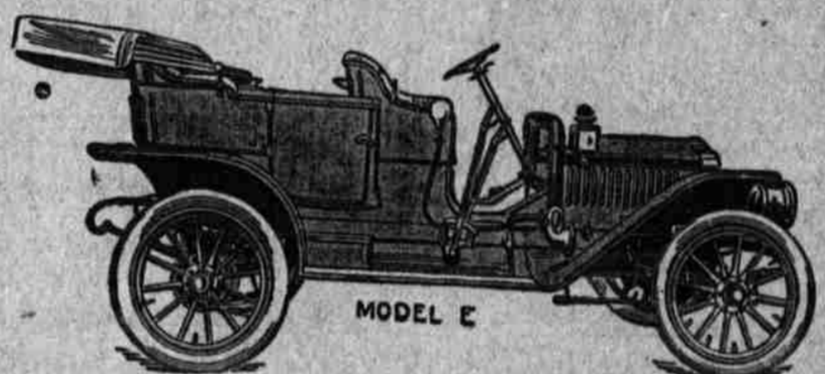
