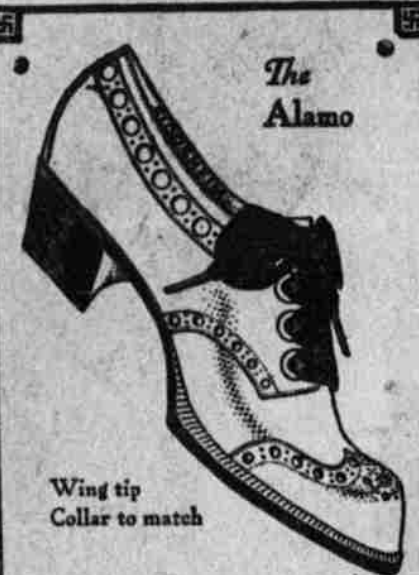

SHORT SESSION OF COUNCIL

NEW ROUTINE MATTERS TAKEN UP AND SETTLED.

City Fountain Will be Removed to 8th and Washington.

On account of the absence of Mayor F. L. Meyers from the city last evening but little was transacted at the weekly meeting of the city council.

Appointment of a committee to look into the matter of alleged nuisances in South La Grande where the city dog pound is located, was made on motion. The corralled dogs bark and yelp so loudly say the residents that life is uncomfortable in the immediate vicinity.

Moving of the city fountain was

also decided upon and it will be erected on the intersection of Elm and Washington in front of the Observer office.

All those who applied for near beer licenses, eleven in all, were granted licenses.

Extension of water mains on V. avenue, advertising ordered for bids for the construction of various sections of macadamized streets, comprised additional pieces of business transacted.

Regarding the city printing there was an action taken to adopt the report of a committee which had been obtaining information on printing from different firms in the city. No authentic bids were submitted in a regular manner however, and there is no record to show what the printing is to cost the city of La Grande in dollars and cents. This probable oversight will likely be rectified in order to make the records complete.

Portland Police Completely Fail To Clear up the Case.

Wants a Fair Hearing

Cleveland, May 26.—Fred Kohler, the "Golden Rule" chief of police, who was suspended by Mayor Baehr pending the hearing of charges of intoxication, immorality and graft, today asked the County Prosecutor Klein to review the charges against him and to start a grand jury investigation if he should find any supporting evidence. Kohler's friends believe he will receive a fairer hearing before the board. Kohler wants the hearing on Tuesday.
