preservation of the peace, health or safety of the city; and no such measure shall become immediately operative unless it shall state, in a separate section, the reasons why it is necessary that it should become immediately operative, and shall be approved by the affirmative vote of three fourths of all the members elected to the city council taken by ayes and noes and also approved by the mayor." Section 9 of the Ordinance is as follows: "Inasmuch as the present Ordinance of the city, prohibiting the disposal of intoxicating liquors, are invalid, and the health, peace and good order of the city are being violated and disturbed, now, therefore, in order to secure the peace, health and safety and good order of the city and of the inhabitants thereof, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after the passage thereof and approval of the Mayor and its publication in one issue each of the Evening Observer and in one issue of the Morning Star on the 13th day of January, 1910."

It is urged by counsel for the plaintiff that from the very nature of things the immediate taking effect of the Ordinance was not necessary for "the preservation of the health, peace or safety of the city." However that may be, our Supreme Court has decided in numerous decisions that the existence of an emergency is a question for the legislative body to decide and is not reviewable by the courts. Biggs vs. McBride, 17 Or., 640, Kaddery vs. City of Portland, 44 Or., 146. Again it is ably urged that the emergency clause does not comply with the law quoted above for the reason that there is no statement that

the taking effect at once is "necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health or safety of the City," and no reason set forth why it is necessary for it to take effect at once. We do not believe that either of these contentions are tenable. Certainly it is not necessary to use the word "immediate" but any word or words of like import is sufficient. Section 9 of the Ordinance does state "an emergency is hereby declared to exist" etc. An emergency is defined by Webster's New International Dictionary as "An unforeseen occurrence or combination of circumstances which calls for immediate action or remedy, pressing necessity, exigency" Section 9 also recites that at that time the passage of the ordinance, that the Ordinances of the city prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquor were invalid, and that the health, good order and peace of the city were being violated and disturbed. These were the reasons assigned for the necessity of the ordinance going into immediate effect. Whether these were good reasons or not, it was for the Council to say and not for the courts. The Council seemed to deem them sufficient for the declaring of an emergency, and this is conclusive under the authorities above cited. Again it is claimed that the Com-
