DETAILS A HELP IN SUCCESS

HORSE SHOW AT UNION LARGELY DEPENDENT ON DETAILS

Promoters Have Chrome Com'g for Splendid Manner of Management

Details always go far in marking the success or failure of any race meet, horse show or athletic or sporting event of any sort, and if attention to minor details spells success, then it is no wonder that the Horse show at Union moved off with out a flaw. Some of the rules rigidly enforced and which have done much to make the meet and show the success which today's events proved it to be, follows:

No entry fee will be charged, free feed and shelter will be furnished to all stock exhibited.

In cases where animals are duly registered such registration certificates must be submitted to committee for approval, prior to judging. Proof of registry must accompany entry.

The single judge system will be the policy of this show, the judges will be selected from one or more of the different state agricultural colleges, whose reputation throughout the state is well known and thoroughly established. The judging to commence at 9 o'clock.

Premiums will be designated by ribbons, blue—first, red—second, and white—third. Championship—royal purple.

The parade will take place promptly at the close of the judging, on Friday, at 2 p. m. All stock exhibited 1. All exhibits must be on the grounds in advance of the time set for judging, in order not to cause any unnecessary delay.

2. An animal can compete in more than one class and in any and every prize and sweepstake groups or specials to which they are eligible, under the classification.

3. One of the main objects of this show is to encourage the breeding and feeding of improved breeds of livestock, for well defined practical purposes. Due regard will be given to symmetry, size, form, action, constitution, vigor and general charac-

teristics of various breeds with reasonable allowance for age, but due regard will also be paid to heads and graceful carriage, style and general refinement that denotes breed character—points, which, while not weighing on the "scale" add a value to animals when being sold for breeding purposes, such encouraging uniformity of breed type.

All animals to be pure bred and registered with a registry association, recognized by the U. S. government, unless otherwise stated in the classification. Pure bred animals under one year need not be registered if their sire and dam are registered as above mentioned.
