Adventists Camp Meeting.

Hutchinson, Minn., June 9.—Seventh Day Adventists to the number of several hundreds encamped here today for a period of preaching and experiencing the "old time religion."

The convention is the annual conference of the denomination in this state, where the Adventists have a large membership and scores of flourishing churches. Lately the church has come into possession of the Hutchinson College property here and the institution will hereafter be devoted

to spreading the doctrines of the Adventists.

Health Legislation.

Schenectady, N. Y., June 9.—Health legislation is the principal subject before the conference of mayors and officials of the second and third class cities of the state, called here today.

Congressional Convention.

Frederick, Md., June 9.—At the Republican Congressional convention for the sixth Maryland district, convened here today, indications point to the nomination of Alexander R. Hagner, of Hagerstown, to make the race. Hagner is now county attorney of Washington county. In 1896 he lost the Republican Congressional nomination by one vote.

Sell Prior's Will.

London, June 9.—Among the rare manuscripts offered for sale to-day at an auction in London is the original probate of the will of Mathew Prior, the great English poet and statesman. It contains many interesting and quaint bequests.

Prior thanks Lord Harley for his "continual friendship," and hopes "he will have the same concern for my memory after death as he had for his honor while alive."

"It is very well," he adds, "that I be buried privately in Westminster Abbey, and that a monument be erected to my memory, wherein may be expressed the public employments I have borne," (sic.) He requests that the inscription be written by Dr. Robert Peind, "the buste expressed in marble." He leaves \$60 lbs. "for this last mark of humane vanity."

Prior died September 18, 1721, in his fifty-eighth year, at Lord Harley's seat of Wimpole, when he was on a visit. He was buried as he desired, "at the feet of Spenser," and his monument was duly erected close to Shadwell's in the Poets' Corner of Westminster Abbey, with an epitaph by Dr. Friend.
