

LADD AMONG THE INJURED

WRECK AT ARLINGTON SCENE OF SIX ACCIDENTS.

One of the Injured Will Probably Die, Say Detailed Reports.

Wreck Victims.
 O. A. Sprule, brakeman, The Dalles, fracture of skull and brain concussion; will probably die.
 Steve Kozacek, tramp, Chicago, Ill., leg crushed, badly bruised; may die.
 George Kozacek, tramp, Racine, Wis., foot crushed, internal injuries; may die.
 Otto Hinkle, fireman, The Dalles,

leg injured, badly bruised; will recover.
 Theo. Metca, section hand, The Dalles, several bruises, not serious.
 William R. Ladd, assistant superintendent O. R. & N., 185 Knott St., Portland, bones in foot broken, not serious.
 William R. Ladd, commonly known as master mechanic on the O. R. & N. and well known in La Grande, is one of the six who were injured in yesterday's after-wreck accidents. The report issued by the Observer yesterday was correct as far as it referred to the actual number hurt in the wreck at Arlington, but yesterday afternoon two others were badly injured, among them Mr. Ladd. A Portland paper relates:

Six men injured, one probably fatally, and two others seriously, is the net result of the wrecking of a westbound freight on the O. R. & N. main line about a mile and half east of Arlington, at 8:55 o'clock last night. O. A. Sprule, of The Dalles, head brakeman of the ill-fated train, is the most seriously injured, having sustained a depressed fracture of the skull and brain concussion. He has little chance of recovery.

Two tramps, Steve and George Kozacek, who were stealing a ride between cars, and on the last lap of their long jump across the continent are in grave condition. They have a fighting chance for life. Otto Hinkle, the fireman, had a miraculous escape when the train was derailed. He sustained several severe lacerations about the legs and feet, but will recover.
 These four men were injured in the wreck itself, while Assistant Superintendent William R. Ladd and Theo. Metca, a section hand, were painfully hurt while clearing up the debris. They were struck by a twisted rail, which flew back and hurled them 20 feet away. Neither one, however, is seriously injured. The six men were brought to Portland by special train this morning, and were taken at once to St. Vincent's Hospital for treatment.

Rains Loosen Rocks.
 The wreck was caused indirectly by the heavy rains which have prevailed in Eastern Oregon for several days past. The freshets had loosened a quantity of rock from the face of a perpendicular cliff, and a huge boulder weighing several tons was precipitated onto the track, just a few minutes before the arrival of the extra freight. The train, consisting of seven cars of merchandise and nine empties, was speeding along at a rapid pace when it reached the slight curve where the rock slide occurred. The engineer, J. G. Lebor, did not see the obstruction in time to apply brakes, and the pilot drove full force into the pile of rock. The engine topped the mass, clearing it, but the tender followed by the 16 cars jumped the track and rolled down the embankment to the brink of the river, which runs but a few feet from the track. The tender was the only car to topple into the stream.
 The speed of the train was such that 400 feet of track was ripped out of the roadbed before the flying wreckage came to a stop, and debris was scattered for several rods about the scene.
 The wreck was entirely unavoidable as the watchman had passed the spot only a short time before and found the track clear. The accident could not have happened at a more fortunate time, for none of the eight passengers which were laid out by the wreck was due at the spot for several hours. Had the rockslide occurred at almost any other hour of the night it is almost inevitable that some one of the numerous passengers, Nos. 4, 10, 12, 6, 9, 3, 11, or 5 would have met with the fate of the extra freight.
