The plans call for the erection of a central administration building, which will be used for officers and as a dormitory for the resident medical staff, while the patients will be housed in portable cottages that can be set up as required.

The advantages of the sanitarium will be exclusively at the disposal of the company's 14,000 employees in the United States and Canada, and its president, John B. Hegeman, says the concern is willing to spend \$100,000 annually in fighting the disease. Many other insurance companies are watching this experiment to enter practically into the campaign against tuberculosis and if it is successful may undertake similar enterprises and extend their advantages to include policy holders as well as employees.
