SHOP SITE NOW SELECTED

EXPENDITURE OF \$160,000 WILL START SOON.

Definite Location of Machine Shops and Added Stalls Made Known.

Location of the huge machine shops which are to be built here this summer, has been agreed upon according to good authority. The new structure costing \$100,000 or thereabouts, will be erected at the east end of the present round house and extend along to the north of it. The extreme east end will be just north of the store house and will be built between the street on the north and the round house and store house on the south.

The west end of the round house is to have six or seven stalls added to it for the accommodation of the Mallets. In all the expenditures will amount to about \$170,000 it is estimated, though the appropriation is only \$160,000.

Local O. R. & N. officials have received official copies of the report of the investigating committee which probed the Arlington wreck a few days since: the report follows:

Extra 2648 West, 47 cars, consisting of 13 loads and 34 empties, 1360 tons, was derailed one and one-half miles east of Arlington, June 16th; locomotive tender and 16 cars were derailed damaging equipment to extent of \$2500, track \$200 and contents of cars \$200. Brakeman Sproule badly injured and Fireman Hinkle slightly injured. Two tramps (names yet unknown) badly injured.

Derailed caused by a large rock which had rolled down from side cut and stopped on track between rails. Extra 2648 west ran over same derailling engine tender and 16 cars. There was no reason to expect rock to be falling at this point—if they did, it could not be expected they would reach the track. On account of the curvature in track engineer could not see the rock until he was

practically upon it—too late to stop the train before striking.

From testimony of witnesses examined, and from the evidence secured at the scene of the accident, the Board is of the opinion that the accident was unavoidable, that proper precautions were taken, track properly patrolled, and the Board exonerates the railroad company and employees from all blame. Local Youngster Threatened to Kill His Mother—Now in Jail

have to go; life was too dear to be spent in close proximity to Willie. The cripple has been in trouble many times but never before have charges been preferred against him that intimated mistreatment of his mother. Usually they are assault cases or minor thefts.
