 wiggled back by the fanout route. Carter bled a little one to the first base runway and McInnis hit the runner in the back. About then, Patten was heading for third and Horton flew quickly and wide to third from first, letting Patten score. Carter had sailed to third in the mixup and scored later when Halgarth rapped out a warm one to safe territory. Hooper brought in the third score for Elgin in the ninth inning when he got a hit, stole second and then

teasing the second base corner, McInnis and Bradley failed to connect and Hooper came to third. He scored on a sacrifice by Miers.

La Grande made one registration in the fourth, though two tickled the pan. Childers hit to third but the player played basketball with the grounder and Shanks put Childers on second with a neat hit. Merrill stole second and scored on a catcher's passed ball.

In the sixth Elgin took a balloon ascension and combined with a swat-fest, well bunched, let in two more scores. Pidcock laced out a two bagger and Bradley landed up on first soon after. McInnis' hit advanced everyone and when "Hock" and Pidcock tried a double steal, the pitcher was allowed to go to second and the play made at home. Pidcock slid in on the bag and after laying on it for a minute or two, started to get up. Just then he was touched, and called out. Bradley scored on Horton's hit in the preceding inning however, Wallace Childers hit safe, advanced on Proe's sacrifice and in a short-lived meteoric shower came home on an overthrow to third. In another instance a La Grande man was home safe, but the batter boosting him along was called out at first striking the side.
