**MORE MACADAM  
 IS COMPLETED**

**BOOTH LANE'S WORST PLACES  
 FOR MUD DISAPPEAR**

Finishing Touches Applied to a Mile  
 and a Quarter of Road.

Finishing touches to a mile and a  
 quarter of macadam road on Booth  
 Lane were applied last night and  
 County Road Superintendent Camp-  
 bell is calling off all macadam crews  
 and the machinery is temporarily idle  
 as far as county work is concerned.  
 The stretch was practically completed  
 several days ago, but the finishing  
 touches needed to make the road com-  
 plete were not applied until last even-  
 ing.

This removes forever one of the  
 bad highways in the county. Booth  
 Lane has always been a sea of  
 mud in the winter time, and as the  
 macadam was placed in the worst  
 district on the Lane, farmers will no  
 more have to wade hub-deep through  
 mud in coming to La Grande during  
 winter and spring months.

 Feb., 1910, creating Improvement Dis-  
 trict No. 16 and designating Sixth  
 Street, as such district, and in pur-  
 suance of a resolution adopted by said  
 Common Council on the 17th day of  
 June, 1910, whereby said Council de-  
 termined and declared its intention  
 to improve all that portion of Sixth  
 Street in said improvement district  
 as hereinafter described by laying  
 thereon Bitulithic pavement, the  
 Council will, ten days after the ser-  
 vice of this notice upon the owners  
 of the property affected and benefited  
 by such improvement, order that said  
 above described improvement be made;  
 that the boundaries of said district to  
 be so improved are as follows: All  
 that portion of Sixth Street, from the  
 North line of Washington Avenue, to  
 the North line of "K" Avenue.

 the Council will levy a special assess-  
 ment on all the property affected and  
 benefited by such improvement for the  
 purpose of paying for such improve-  
 ment. That the estimated cost of  
 such improvement is the sum of  
 \$31,984.00.
