Many Small Losers.

Mr. H. A. Adams, owner of the building occupied by the Suydam second hand store, was damaged to the extent of \$1800. The building extended back into the alley district and

was occupied in the rear by five roomers who lost all. "Tom", the Myers barbershop shiner was among those who lost everything in their rooms. These buildings which are really annexes to the building proper, are complete losses. The second hand store was damaged considerably.

Suydam Loss Heavy.

Fire did not damage the goods in the second hand store, but water did, notwithstanding the valiant assistance from bystanders.

Mrs. Mary Noble was also a heavy loser though she carried some insurance. The building occupied by the National Tea and Coffee house, managed by Mrs. N. M. Stacy, was gutted to an extent that it is worthless. The loss to the building adjoining the annexes, will reach \$3,000. Mrs. Stacy who lived in the building, lost practically all her furniture and all the stock. This amounts to \$500.

Mrs. Zuber lost some wooden structures in the rear of the Keefer hotel that will total about \$100.

The block is gutted and all that is standing is the buildings fronting on the streets. The Independent Telephone Company cable was burned, but will be repaired before nightfall it is believed.

Fruitdale Makes Showing.

Z. Chandler, who has three and a quarter acres in strawberries in Fruitdale, has just finished taking off a crop of 354 crates, which netted him \$1.75 a crate.
