To Whom It May Concern: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Common Council of the City of La Grande, Oregon, on the 8th day of June, 1910, creating Improvement District No. 1, 2 and 3, and designating Willow Street from alley between Adams Avenue and Jefferson Avenue to the alley between Adams Avenue and Washington Avenue; the alley between Washington and Adams Avenue from "K" Street to Fourth Street; "N" Avenue from alley between Adams Avenue and Washington Avenue to Fourth Street; "O" Avenue from the alley between Adams Avenue and Washington Avenue to First Street; Pennsylvania Avenue from the

alley between Adams Avenue and Washington Avenue to First Street; Third Street, from Main Avenue to Pennsylvania Avenue; Fourth Street from Adams Avenue to Pennsylvania Avenue; alley between Fifth and Sixth Streets from Washington Avenue to Pennsylvania Avenue; the alley between Sixth Street and Seventh Street from Washington Avenue to Pennsylvania Avenue, the alley between Seventh Street and Eighth Street from Washington Avenue to Pennsylvania Avenue; the alley in Block 104, from Fourth Street to Washington Avenue on alley between Fifth and Sixth Streets, as District No. 3, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said Common Council on the 8th day of June, 1910, whereby said Council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of said District No. 3, as herein-after described by constructing sewers therein, the council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such improvement or said district to be so improved are as follows: Willow Street from Main Avenue to "Penn" Avenue between Adams Avenue and Jefferson Avenue to the alley between Adams Avenue and Washington Avenue the alley between Washington Avenue and Adams Avenue from "K" Street to Fourth Street.
