NORTHWEST HOT WAVE SERVERE

NO SERIOUS DAMAGE TO CROPS EXPERIENCED THUS FAR.

One Prostration Reported from Seattle Today—Heat Decreasing.

Portland, July 11.—A hot wave is making temperature torrid in the Northwest today, but indications are it will be cooler weather soon, as it is not so warm today as yesterday. In the Willamette valley, a general average was 90, eastern Oregon, Washington, and parts of western Idaho points fluctuate from 90 to 108.

General reports indicate crops were undamaged as far as advanced. If the heat continues experts say the crops will be slightly hurt.

One prostration is reported from Seattle today. He was a laborer. Yesterday the hot weather record was broken in Seattle and indications are for hotter weather in Northwestern Washington this afternoon.

La Grande has suffered more the past two days from heat than in any time this year, though the cooling breeze prevent prostrations and extreme suffering. The mercury has fluctuated between ninety-five and ninety-eight degrees since yesterday morning. The surrounding fishing streams, the park and up-river points were the relief places of scores of families yesterday, consequently the intense heat in the city was not generally known.
