NO SPECIAL SESSION

Chief Justice Not to be Nominated Until Next Fall Says Taft.

SWINGING OHIO TO INSURGENTS

Former Secretary Garfield Aligns Himself with Insurgents.

Cleveland, July 12.—An insurgent campaign to bring Ohio into the insurgent column was finally launched today, following a speech by Former Secretary of the Interior Garfield, before the new progressive republican club last night. He said, "At the coming election we are to choose between two great national parties. The democratic party, while declaring against special interests while in power, has allied itself with special interests. In recent democratic conventions the Progressives were ignored. The republicans likewise have among their leaders, some of whom are allied with special interests. On the other hand, the Progressives are aggressive leaders, and representatives of the people. The country owes a debt of gratitude to them."

WOMEN WILL YELL LUSTILY.

Parliament Will Take Some Action on The Suffrage Movement.

London, July 12.—The first decisive action by parliament on the bill favoring woman suffrage is expected at tonight's meeting of the Commons. London police are preparing to act accordingly, as the Suffragettes expect the bill will be defeated.

They declare they will pack the galleries and use lung power persuasion with the law makers.

The measure in effect is to grant the right of franchise to women who own property, giving them right to vote for a member of parliament. Hitherto women have had only elective rights in municipal elections.
