## THREE-CORNER GAME OFF. Cove and Elgin Will Very Likely be Only Teams in the Tournament.

There seems to be some obstruction in the way of arranging the three-team Reach tournament at Elgin for this month as was planned. Weston the easy champion of the Umatilla county teams, is disorganized since its schedule closed and these seems to be but little chance of resurrecting the players there. Elgin however, feels confident that Cove will come and in this way the championship of everything east of the Blue Mountains can be determined. Elgin was at the head of the intercounty league when the explosion took place, and Cove is manifestly the leaders in the Eastern Oregon league. Cove has signified its intentions of playing a three-game series with Elgin, one at Cove, one at Elgin and one on foreign grounds, though it may be found satisfactory to play two of the games at either of the two towns.

## NO GAME TOMORROW Only Possible Contest is Elgin at Enterprise Tomorrow Afternoon

La Grande is not to be favored with a ball game tomorrow and it is doubtful if there will be one in Wallowa county. Elgin is planning some on going to Enterprise tomorrow but it is doubtful if the game will materialize. Joseph is no more and neither is La Grande in a very promising condition. While there may be an occasional game during the rest of the season, baseball of an organized sort is now a thing of history again for this year.

## Junior Championships.

New York, July 16.—Junior track and field championships of the Metropolitan Association will be decided this afternoon at Celtic Park, with some of the most promising young athletes of the country taking part.

The following events are scheduled: 100-yard run, 220-yard run, 440-yard run, 880-yard run, one-mile run, three mile run; 120 yard high hurdle and 220-yard low hurdle; shot, hammer and throwing the discus; throwing 56

pound weight; throwing javelin; high and running broad jump; pole vault, running hop, step and jump.

## Regatta on the Hudson.

New York, July 16.—Crack oarsmen of the metropolis will compete today in the regatta of the Hudson River Rowing association, the contestants also including several up-state crews. The program embraces junior single and double four-oared gigs, junior and senior four-oared barges and junior centipede.

## Protest Against Pictures.

Boston, July 16.—Films illustrating the recent Jeffries-Johnson fight at Reno are said to be on the way to this city and it is the announced intention of the moving picture men to place them on exhibition Monday. The mayor and chief of police and the governor have been deluged with communications demanding that the presentation of the pictures be prevented definite action to this end is expected. The picture exhibitors will doubtless appeal to the courts if necessary, to protect their rights.

## Cyclists in Brussels.

Brussels, July 16.—Some of the world's best bicycle riders are in Brussels today in readiness for the races of the International Cyclists' Union. The preliminaries will be held tomorrow and the world's championship events will be decided next Thursday and the following Sunday, July 24. It has already been decided to hold the 1911 international bicycle races in Turin.

## When Solid Iron Floats.

Experiments have shown that if a ball of solid iron be lowered into a mass of liquid iron by means of a metal fork the ball at first sinks to the bottom with the fork, but that in a few seconds it will leave the prongs and rise to the surface, where it continues to float until it melts. The rising is explained by the expansion of the ball, due to heating, whereby it becomes, bulk for bulk, less dense than the molten metal.—St. Louis Republic.

## MAN, STUDY YOUR HAIR!

Then Before You Comb It Study the Architecture of Your Face.

Just as surely as hair is woman's crowning glory it is man's glorious crowning—that is, to those that have it. Those whose heads have pushed up through their hair usually use a huckaback towel for the delicate process of parting the hair, but unless one has the peculiar requirements it is not worth while to cultivate them.

Men with low, squatting foreheads should not pull their hair down over their brows, and men whose foreheads are beginning to work back should invite their locks down. If your hair has quietly slipped down toward your ears on each side, leave it there. If you bring it up in strings and wisps it will merely look like climbing vines and will never really have the free and easy homelike appearance that ought to be the part of all natural hair.

Do not part your hair any earlier than you can help. Hair is in a hurry these days, anyway. Usually it doesn't stay more than long enough to make sure that the baby is going to be a boy before it hastens off. It will part of itself soon enough the best you can do.

Before combing your hair you should get acquainted with the architecture of your face. If your face is of the harvest moon variety do not tlay your hair. Puff it up as much as possible. It's better to look like a feather duster on a Monday morning than a scratched billiard ball on a Saturday night.

But if your face is of a long, galloping ensemble do not encourage your hair to fluff. Instead keep it down close to headquarters. If your head inclines to run up to a cone do not spread your hair around in imitation of a palm tree thatch. Rather fluff it up and windrow it for fear some un-bred person will begin to talk about spring radish tops—Homer Croy in Tollheator.
