### FOUR SPLENDID STALLIONS TO ENTERPRISE

#### Wallowa Horse Breeders Emulating Union County Stockmen.

The Wallowa county horse breeders are determined to emulate practice of Union county horsemen and produce a better grade of horses is indicated by a shipment of Percherons sent to Enterprise this morning. A. F. Work was the shipper and four splendid percheron stallions, and two Percheron fillies comprising the entire carload of imported stock, were sent in this morning on the Joseph train. The stock is direct from foreign dealers, and will do much to tone up the breeds of Wallowa county, where good horseflesh is already prevalent.

# TRAIN HORRIBLY MUTILATES EMPLOYEE

### UNCERTAIN WHERE THE REMAINS WILL BE INTERRED

#### Switchman Coming Here From Seattle Meets Horrible Death Here.

It is not known whether or not the mutilated remains of A. M. Johnson the switchman instantly killed late yesterday afternoon, will be buried in La Grande or returned to Seattle where the unfortunate man had many friends and relatives. The distracted widow of the young man, who only recently arrived from Seattle to join her husband, is desirous of returning the body to Seattle but undertakers claim it is practically impossible, or least not feasible. The local members of the switchman's union are looking after the details of the funeral arrangements.

Johnson was killed last evening at 6 o'clock while the switch engine was pushing a string of logging cars to the Palmer mill. Johnson and another man were riding on the leading car, when suddenly Johnson was seen by his companion to fall directly in front of the rapidly moving train. The other man on the car could not signal the engineer before several cars had passed over the body, cutting, smashing and terribly mutilating it.

The unfortunate man is survived by a wife, of similar age, who naturally enough, is a physical wreck today following the accident.

Johnson came here last May from Seattle and has been employed by the O. R. & N., since that time.
