### REAGAN CHOSEN PRESIDENT

IRISHMEN HAVE WARM FIGHT OVER A LEADER

Mathew Cummings Defeated by Narrow Margin This Afternoon

Portland, July 22.—James Reagan of St. Paul, and former vice president of the Ancient order of Hibernians, was elected president of the organization this afternoon by a majority of twelve votes over Mathew Cummings the re-

turning president. The election followed one of the hardest fights in the history of the convention.

### MONSTER BAND IN A BOX

HOT LAKE INSTALLS INSTRUMENT THAT IS MARVEL

Produces Band Music and Orchestra Music With Perfect Harmony.

What is declared to be the largest instrument of its kind, and costing \$5,000, direct from Germany, was installed at Hot Lake this morning when an orchestra and band of no small numbers, all combined in one music box, was set in motion. It is a 30-

piece band and a 12-piece orchestra all working with perfect harmony. It produces German compositions in dance and concert music with startling effect. It is the largest in Oregon.

The violin, cello and other classical attachments are perfect and do not resemble the old-fashioned music box by any means for its tunes and tones are as life like as the best band could make them. The only instruments like it are to be found in California where they are meeting with much popularity.

One of the California machines is now used in the famous New Cliff house and the other on a dance floor at Rendons beach were \$20,000 were spent on the floor alone. Able to meet the demands of the fashionable patrons of these two places, the instrument will of course find ready popularity at Hot Lake.

### SORROW IN THE BIG FORT

GOVERNMENT WILL PAY FOR THE FUNERAL EXPENSES

Eleven Victims of Yesterday's Explosion Will be Buried Tomorrow

Norfolk, Va., July 22.—The great rifles at Fortress Monroe are silent today. The national guard standard flies half mast, and the eleven dead await burial as the result of the explosion yesterday. Colonel Townsely, commandant of the fort, today notified the families that the government would attend to details of burial and expenses. The commandant in his report to the war department, speaks highly of the bravery of the men who survived and who risked life to prevent further disaster. He reports the accident due to premature discharge of gun 1 of the derusey 1235 battery.

### ECCENTRIC PAVING.

Louis XIV. Covered One Courtyard With Silver and Gold.

Many interesting instances of individual eccentricity or extravagance in the selection of material for paving streets and roads may be cited. It is related that when Maximilian Emanuel succeeded to the throne of Bavaria he celebrated the event by causing one of the roads leading to his palace to be paved with plates of burnished copper. This, gleaming in the sunshine, gave all the effect of the more precious metal—gold.

We are told also that Louis XIV. paved one of the courts at Versailles with squares of silver, each of which had recorded upon it some triumph of the French arms. In the center of the court stood a large tablet of gold in representation of the luxurious monarch's favorite emblem, the sun. Members of the time of Louis make mention of a lodge erected to the love of his youth, the fair Louise de la Val-

here. The approach was paved with mirrors wherein was painted an allegory setting forth the undying devotion of the king to Louise.

An eccentric nobleman of Milan conceived the idea of paving the courtyard of his palace with slabs of marble, granite and other stone, each from a different land. It is said that Europe, America, Asia, Africa and Australia all contributed materials to make up this quaint mosaic composed of more than 1,000 pieces, every one of which was suitably inscribed with the name of the country or state whence it came.—Harper's Weekly.

### George Washington's Sobriquets.

Washington was called by many sobriquets. He was first of all "Father of His Country." "Providence left him childless that his country might call him father." Sigourney calls him "Pater Patriae;" Chief Justice Marshall, the "American Fabius." Lord Byron in his "Ode to Napoleon" calls him "the Cincinnatus of the West." For having a new world on his shoulders he was called the "Atlas of America." The English soldier called him by the sarcastic nickname of "Lovely Georgius." Red Jacket, the Seneca Indian chief, called him the "Flower of the Forest." The Italian poet Vittorio Alfieri called him "Deliverer of America." His bitter opponents sarcastically called him the "Stepfather of His Country" during his presidency.
