

FARMERS' HELP EASTERN FIRM IS PLENTIFUL AFTER PLATS

ON THE OTHER HAND, WOOD CUTTERS ARE HARD TO GET

Indications Point to Scarcity of Wood in City Next Winter.

Farmers are having but little difficulty in securing help, especially when the farms lie close to La Grande or any of the valley towns. If they do, local employment agencies hear but little of it. Usually at this time of the year there is a great dearth of farm help, but every day finds men and boys calling at employment agencies in this city seeking for work but can not be supplied farm positions.

Wood cutters, on the other hand, are hard to get and it appears that very little wood is being cut in the mountains surrounding the city this summer. Indications point to high prices and but little supply next winter for the Kamela supply is about exhausted and the wood owners near La Grande are having trouble getting the wood out.

LOCAL FIRM HAS FILLED SEVERAL LARGE ORDERS

District Between Elgin and Walla Walla is Territory Investigated

Orders from New York contracting firms for all the township plats in the Blue Mountains between Elgin and Walla Walla are coming to local platting firms regularly and considerable speculation is rife as to what it means. During the past three weeks, the Williamson land office has filled large orders from New York calling for plats in the district mentioned and as no explanation is needed or given, it has raised considerable speculation.

That the orders for plats are related in some way to the request for data relative to geographical conditions and transportation facilities by two Eastern contracting firms that build railroads exclusively, from the La Grande Investment company some time ago, seems logical, but to what extent is not known.

It is encouraging in any event to know that New York financiers and contractors are looking to Eastern Oregon for information that can mean but one thing—prospective railroad construction.

Maxwell Wins

Thrills followed thrills as speeding automobiles shot around the course of the Ingleside Race Course, on April 24th, in the second and final day events of the successful meet promoted by the members of Islam Temple of the Mystic Shrine.

The honors of the day were divided between Barney Oldfield, with his 200 horsepower Benz machine, and C. O. King, with his Maxwell 30 horsepower stock car. Oldfield lowered his previous record of one mile to 51 5-6, which is a new coast record for the circular track. With the exception of this performance, Oldfield had to take second place in the list of racing honors, as the world's champion met defeat in both the five and fifteen mile handicap events, and in both races King and his Maxwell were the victors. In fact, King proved the surprise of the meet, driving all of his races with much judgment and taking the turns with his car as close to the fence as did Oldfield. In the five mile handicap, Oldfield drove his Knox racer to the utmost, but the handicap was too strong and he could not get the lead away from King. Not only in the handicap events did King and his Maxwell prove stars of the first order, but in one of the first events of the day, the five mile race for cars costing from \$1200 to \$1600, which was one of the best matches of the meet.

The time for the five mile handicap was as follows: Maxwell, King, 4.40.30; Oakland, Nelson, 4.48.25; Chalmers, West, 4.49.30; Auto Car, finished fourth, and the Knox car, Barney Oldfield driving, fifth.

In the event number eight, ten miles free-for-all handicap, King and his Maxwell again were the winners, the Maxwell's time being 8.19.30.
