

MUCH WORK AT MEETING

COUNCIL SETTLES DOWN TO A LONG PERIOD OF AFFAIRS

Long String of Business Deals Closed Up During the Evening.

After considerable delay, the city council met last night and a large grist of routine business was transacted. The business opened with a report from the committee to which was filed the O. W. Moon complaint, relative to the construction of some sidewalk in South La Grande by Street Superintendent Matott. The matter was again referred to committees.

The bid of the Sutherland company for construction of 800 feet of sewers, which has been under consideration for some time, was awarded to Mr. Sutherland.

The city auditor's report was read, showing the books accurately kept, with the exception of mistakes in figuring interest on some money and the company will have to refund.

The regular budget of bills was ordered paid.

Adams avenue improvement fund No. 1, was drawn on for \$2376 as payment to J. L. Mann for macadam work done on Adams from Willow to Balm street.

A warrant of \$206,396.69 was ordered drawn in favor of the Warren Construction company as part payment for work already done on the streets.

The Amalgamated Sugar company wants a tap on the park water line for fire protection. The matter was referred.

The national conservation congress has invited two delegates from this city to attend the St. Paul meeting when it convenes.

Mayor F. L. Myers was invited to attend a congress of Oregon mayors at Marshfield soon.

Street carnival licenses were not granted to C. M. Follow, who wanted such a privilege.

Mary Noble asked for permission to build some wood sheds near the fire limits and the matter was turned over to a committee.

The fire and police committee has been changed because of absence of regular members of that committee Tom Fleming is now the chairman and Andrews and Logsdon are the other members of it.

There were no remonstrances to paving West Adams avenue and the work will proceed.

The Eastern Oregon Light and Power company was asked to remove light poles on Fir, Depot and Elm streets.

A man by the name of Bush desired permission to operate a merry-go-

round within the fire limits. There is nothing to hinder the movement.

The street pavement ordinance on Adams avenue between Willow and Orchard was read for the first time and before it can go on its final passage the city engineer must apportion the cost to each abutting property owner.

The matter of caring for garbage at hotels, and refuse at livery barns will be cared for by the ordinance, and will make these places screen in the refuse heaps to prevent contagion.

Creation of an improvement district on Sixth street for the construction of sidewalks was petitioned for and Andrews, Logsdon and Fleming were named to estimate the expense.

The bid of John Mars for the construction of macadam on West Adams avenue was accepted and an ordinance will be introduced at the next meeting covering this action.

A remonstrance to certain improvements on First street was read and referred.

An arc light was petitioned for by residents on Fourth and Washington. This was referred to the street committee.

The matter of a garbage dump was gone into at considerable detail and ended in a special committee of Logsdon, Sheak and Monroe being named to confer with George Batly, owner of two acres of land on the river. The city is asked to build a levee in payment for the privilege.

Fourth street residents petitioned the council to let the pavement of that street go over until the street can be paved with bitulithic pavement.

An arc light on Third and Spring was referred.

Remonstrances against J. W. White piling wood on certain districts were read. It was found that the remonstrators were "out of order."
