ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. It shall be the duty of every hotel keeper, boarding house keeper, the proprietor of every household and every person having slops, swill, kitchen refuse, decaying animal or vegetable matter or other garbage, on the premises to be deliverd to a scavenger or garbage man for the purpose of being transported away from said premises, to keep the same in tightly covered can, barrel or other receptacle, and to keep all such articles separate from any tin cans, glassware, crockery, or ashes.

Section 2. All scavengers, and persons who shall transport any slops, swill, kitchen refuse, decaying animal or vegetable matter or other garbage through the streets of the city. Oregon. shall provide a close fitting cover for THE CITY OF LA GRANDE DOES and use the same on every wagon box. can, barrel or other receptacle in and keep away all such garbage from all tin cans, glassware, crockery or ashes, while hauling or dumping the
