

TWIN FALLS IS LOUD IN ITS PRAISE

TWIN FALLS HAS DONE WONDERS FOR THAT COUNTRY

Twin Falls Papers Teem with Praise For Their System There

What irrigation has done for Twin Falls this year is not expressible in dollars and cents. The people there are so elated over their irrigation system that the papers from the rapidly growing town of Twin Falls, sing of little else. Every page carries some praise for irrigation. When other sections, among them Grande Ronde, are suffering more or less from want of water, the Twin Falls country is blooming like a fertile garden, and why? Because the district is well irrigated. It might be of interest to Union county people to read excerpts from a Twin Falls paper of recent date:

Twin Falls is the mecca to which investors of all classes, who have traveled largely, are now turning with more assurance than ever that it is the best place in the United States where capital may be placed with positive assurance that losses are impossible.

This applies especially to the irrigated farm lands, whose prices are low compared to what they are worth as producers merely of alfalfa. Next may be considered the wonderfully prolific irrigated soil, which grows everything in vast profusion when almost every other part of the country fails through various causes, as has been the rule this year.

"Lucky from the very beginning of its existence, the fickle goddess stands faithfully by this country, even during a year when the elements of nature are most unkindly dealing with

every other section of the entire United States, and their people are crying in distress.

"Alex McPherson returned Sunday from an extended tour of the east and northwest and said that he was glad to be again in this most glorious region.

"Colorado's supply has been fearfully short, and all over the state the farmers have suffered seriously for lack of it. In the central west there has not been sufficient rainfall, and the heat has withered everything.

"These conditions have been experienced throughout the identical sections where there has been for many months a concerted effort on the part of the bankers to discourage the movement of the farmers and their money into the newly irrigated sections, especially of Idaho.

"It has been considerably through the influence of these and the greater banking elements that irrigation enterprises have been hampered lately in various parts of the intermountain section, and many of them temporarily but definitely delayed.

"Now the same farmers of the central west who haven't raised anything this year are saying to these same bankers that, regardless of what the banker's advice has been, they are determined to remove to countries where they can be assured of raising crops every year.

"This is going to redound greatly to the benefit of the Twin Falls region, which has proven beyond a doubt this year that when all others fail it is a winner.

"The crops we now have prove the representations which have been made from the beginning, that Twin Falls has the best irrigation supply in all the United States, as well as the best land.

"As an advertisement our experience this year is worth many thousands of dollars to us, and it goes without saying that we may expect a very large demand for Twin Falls land henceforth."

"Things look better here than anywhere I have been. There are opportunities here that exist nowhere else, and with the development that is in progress it cannot fail to continue to be the most opportune locality for the man who has a little money with which to operate.

"I refer to other things besides gold mining, especially with reference to lands under irrigation. The prices are yet sufficiently low to permit of investments that cannot fail to bring large returns."

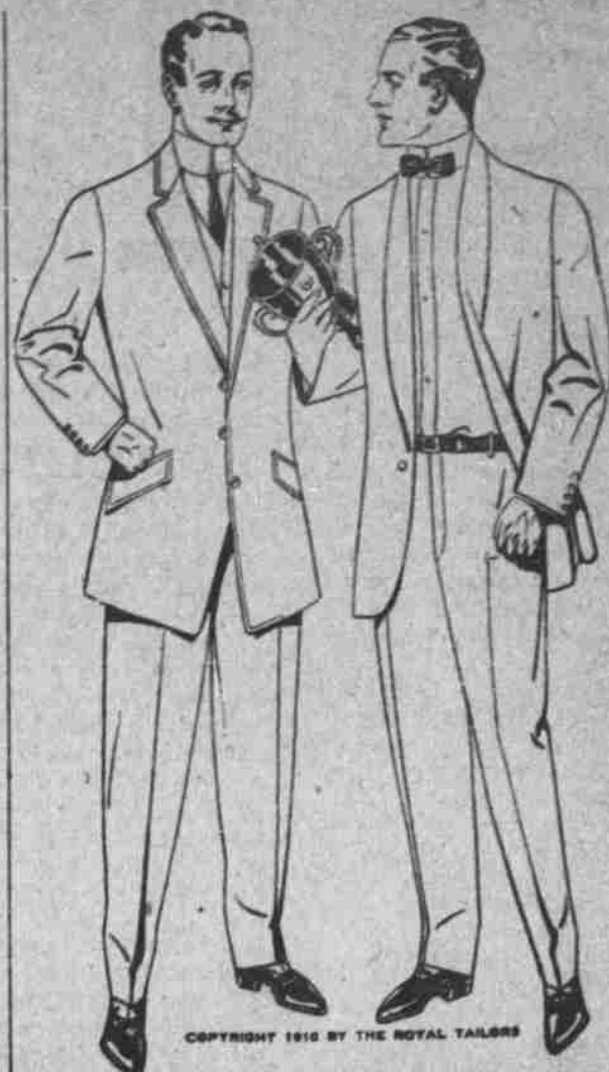
