GIRL DRAGGED BY SKIRTS IN A RUNAWAY

MISS BANTON OF LADD CANYON ESCAPES MIRACULOUSLY

Leaps From Buggy When Horse Bolts And Skirts Tangle With Wheels

Ladd Canyon, Aug. 4.—Special.—What might have been a very serious accident occurred Sunday when Miss Mary Banton was the victim of a runaway. Miss Banton, in company with her father, Wm. Banton, had driven to Mrs. Lucy Graham's ranch on business, and was returning home, when the bridle came off one of the horse's head, causing it to become scared and run away.

Miss Banton, imagining she would be safer, leaped from the vehicle, her skirts catching between the brake and the wheel. The sudden jerk of the wheel freed her from where she was pinned, but as her skirts became tangled in the spokes of the wheel she was dragged at least a quarter of a mile and hurled over two stone fences, which had two strands of barbed-wire on top of them. Besides being bruised a little, Miss Banton only has a slight scratch on her shoulder, and some clothes torn into carpet rags.

Hudson Bay Presents Problem.

Washington, Aug. 4.—Three hundred years after its discovery by Henry Hudson, who first sailed out into the big sea bearing his name on August 4, 1610, Hudson Bay presents a problem which may give rise to a dispute more menacing to Anglo-American relations. Canada is now preparing to take active possession of the rich territory about Hudson Bay, to build a railroad to its shores and to open the "Mediterranean of Canada" to commerce.

This action may, and doubtless will, bring about a dispute as to sovereignty over the bay between this country about the bay is capable of vast development, and, with the completion of the railway, an important grain outlet will also be at stake. The southern part of Hudson Bay is in a latitude farther south than London, and the climate compares very favorably with that of the same latitude in other parts of the globe.
