

Ordinance No 469, Series 1910.

An ordinance authorizing the Mayor and Recorder to enter into a contract with J. L. Mars for macadamizing Adams avenue from the east curb line of 4th street to the west side of Alder street.

THE CITY OF LA GRANDE DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Mayor and Recorder of the City of La Grande be and they are hereby authorized to enter into a contract with J. L. Mars, for macadamizing Adams avenue from the east curb line of 4th street to the west side of Alder street, for a sum not to exceed the amount stated in the bid for said work.

Section 2. Inasmuch as it is expedient and necessary that this ordinance go into effect at once, so that the work may be done as soon as possible, now, therefore, in order to preserve the peace, health and safety of the city, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after the 6th day of August, 1910, after its approval by the Mayor, and its publication for one issue in the La Grande Evening Observer.

Passed the Council on the 3rd day of August, 1910, by 5 members voting therefor.
