Where the valley begins to widen; where the green vegetation marks the contour of the foothills; where smoke from the saw mills curls upward as you travel on the O. & N. branch line from La Grande, you will be found the beautiful little city of Wallowa.

Wallowa, pretty name, isn't it? Sounds like one of Longfellow's pet Indian names. Well, an Indian name.

And one best bunch of "Indians" reside in Wallowa that can be found anywhere in the Northwest. They are good rooters, good hustlers and never forget to say the word for Wallowa that counts. With the many institutions that are now running and others contemplated, the people have every reason to believe they will also have a "pay roll" town. In fact they roll in Wallowa at the present

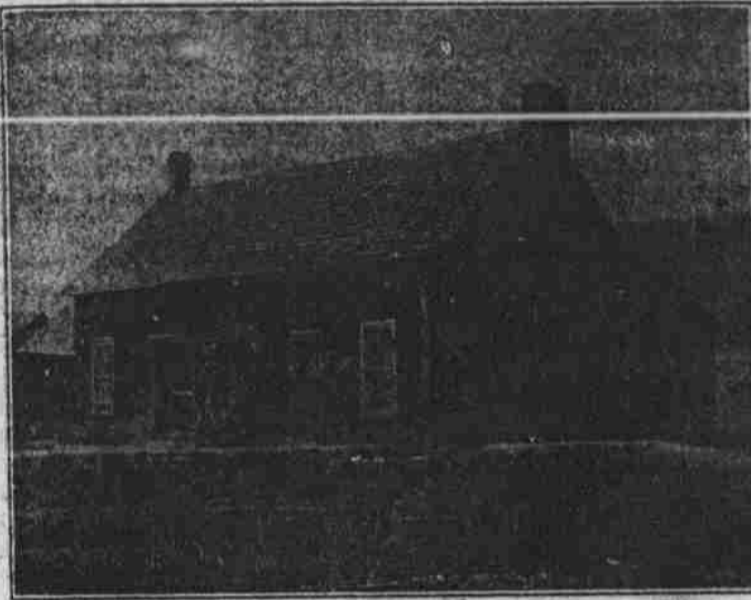

Has a Good Creamery.

Like most modern towns Wallowa has a good creamery. It is run by Tully Brothers, with H. E. Hanley as manager. It is known as the Blue Mountain Creamery and has for fifteen years, been a market for the butter fat of that portion of the valley. Most of the finished product is shipped to Spokane and other Northwest markets. The ice business of the city is carried on by this concern also.
