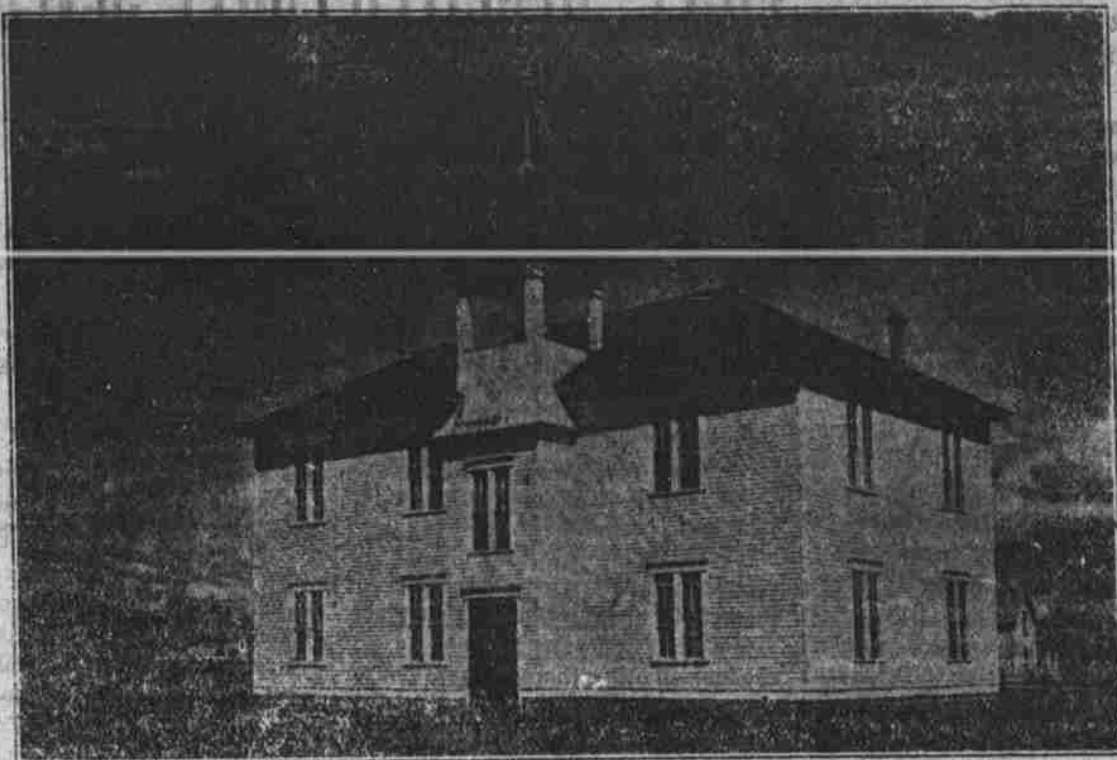

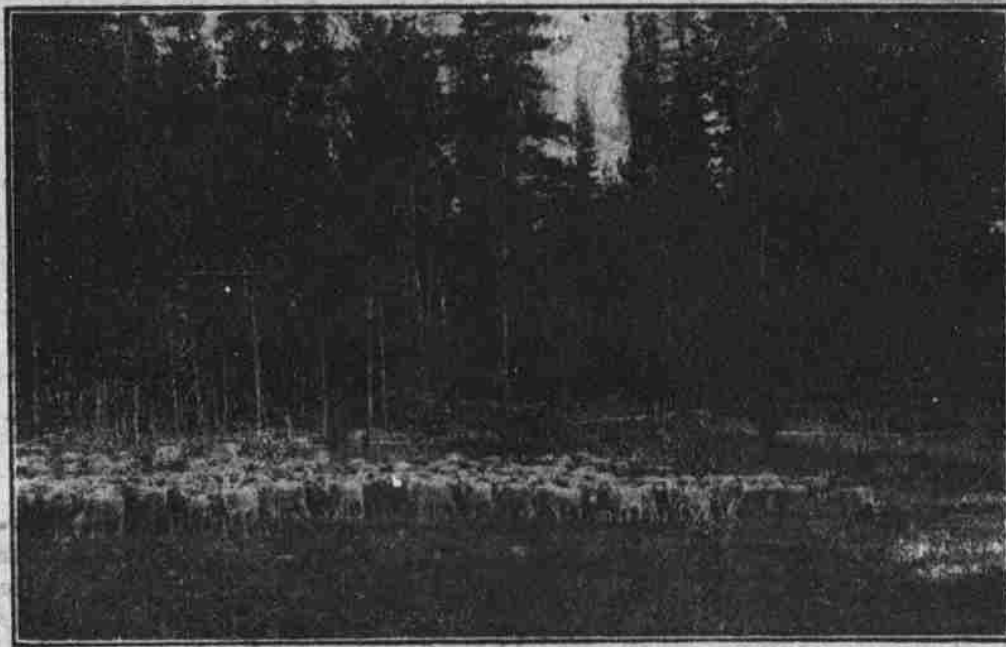
ONE OF WALLOWA'S SCHOOL HOUSES.

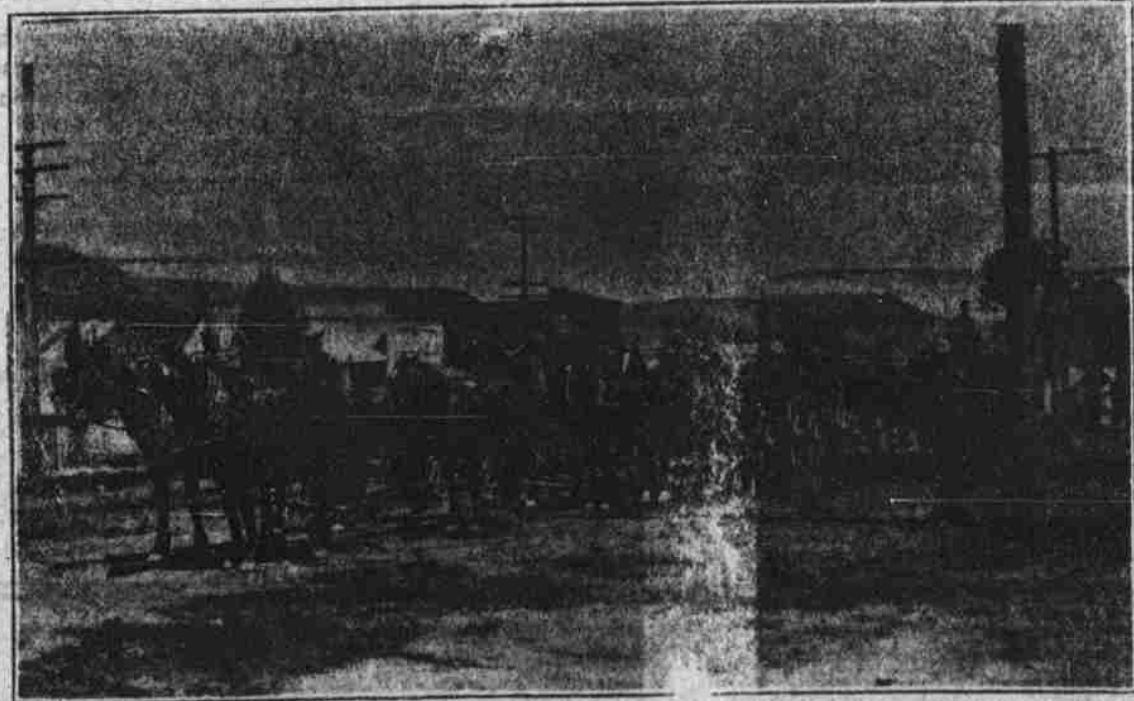


SOME REVENUE PRODUCERS IN WALLOWA COUNTY.
