Cooling Suggestions For the Hot Weather

EAT AS LITTLE AS YOU CAN, JUST ENOUGH TO KEEP YOU GOING. KEEP AS QUIET AS POSSIBLE. DON'T DRINK TOO MUCH AT MEALS. USE ICE WATER FREELY, BUT PUT YOUR HANDS IN IT INSTEAD OF PUTTING IT IN YOUR MOUTH.

It shouldn't be very hard to keep cool in warm weather if you act right and eat right.

GOOD MILK AND BREAD—you can't find anything better to eat on these roasting days. You don't want to eat sugar and sweet things because they give you heat so quickly.

Alcohol gets into circulation in two or three minutes after you drink it, and sugar in about five minutes.

Starch takes a half or three-quarters of an hour to get into circulation, so after you eat starchy foods you have time enough to cool off before they get into the blood.

CUT DOWN YOUR EATING. EAT ABOUT TWO-THIRDS LESS THAN YOU EAT IN COOLER WEATHER. WHAT WE EAT FOR ANYWAY, IN LARGE MEASURE, IS TO KEEP WARM. WHEN THE TEMPERATURE IS AT 90 DEGREES WE NEED TO EAT ENOUGH TO KEEP THE TEMPERATURE OF OUR BODIES AT 98 DEGREES. BUT WHEN THE OUTSIDE TEMPERATURE IS 90 DEGREES WE NEED TO EAT ONLY ENOUGH TO MAKE UP THE REMAINING 8 DEGREES. EAT JUST AS LITTLE AS YOU CAN.

Fruit that is good fruit—not decayed in the least—is splendid for the hot weather menu, and there is a delightful variety of fruits in the market at present.

DON'T EAT MEAT, or, if you feel that you can't get along without it, eat light meat such as veal or chicken. Cheese you will find is better than meat and just as satisfying.

Iced drinks are not harmful if you take them in moderation. Be sure not to drink TOO MUCH ICED STUFF at meals. And don't drink it fast—just sip it a little at a time as you feed a sick person. Iced tea is not injurious if it isn't too strong. The trouble is when you drink iced tea you drink enough to keep you awake all night.

LEMONADE IS A DELICIOUS THIRST QUENCHER.

Be careful not to make it very sweet or strong. Don't put in the oil from the lemon peel. Many people, you know, cut up the lemon and let it float in the lemonade, peel and all. The oil from the lemon peel, like the oil from the orange peel, is harmful.

EAT A LITTLE ICE CREAM, should you like it, but be sure the ice cream is good.
