Methodist ministers from all over the Idaho Conference, District Superintendent J. D. Gilliland, will assemble at Joseph next Thursday to attend the annual conference. Many of them will get their first glimpse of Wallowa county. The people of Joseph are sparing no pains to make the stay one to be long remembered by those who
