WHEAT SITUATION. French Crops a Total Failure—Turn To United States for Aid.

Portland, Aug. 16.—Foreign crops are ruined by excessive rains, and France has turned to America for wheat. Local exporters have been ordered to buy Bluestem. Although the market advanced 2 1-2 cents, and only small lots moved within the past 24 hours, from the interior, on a basis of 98 1-2, trackage to Portland. Farmers are holding throughout the Northwest, seemingly believing higher prices will prevail.

A prominent French grainman at Chicago, said: "It will take France several years to recover from the failure of her crops. Terrific rains have ruined them, and farmers and bankers have tremendous losses. Usually we look to Bulgaria, Russia and Argentina for wheat, but this year we turn to America, as a last resort."
