MURDER AND ROBBERY ON SEA TOLD BY PARTICIPANTS

San Francisco, Aug. 23.—Led, manaced before the coroner's jury and the body of Captain Wood, who had been murdered by a confederate, George B. Wise, the confessed pirate retold his story of how he and his companion had tried to wreck and loot the steamer Buckman, to the jury today. He showed a remorse. His partner West and the other bandit jumped into the sea. Wise stated that they planned to beach the ship

and make their escape, just south of Cape Blanco on the Oregon coast. Had they succeeded it is almost a certainty that many of the passengers would have been drowned, as the coast at this point is very rough and the breakers are abundant.

Wise was taken later to Alameda county where he was placed in jail to be held for his trial. The crime was committed on the high seas on Saturday when the vessel was enroute to San Francisco from Seattle.
