GRANULATED EYELIDS.

One may walk down town, on a windy day, when the boisterous little gusts are throwing the dirt off the streets, and the refuse of the alleys in every direction.

He will "squint" his eyes, in order to protect them, but despite every precaution, little particles may lodge there.

By the time he reaches his destination, the sensitiveness of the smarting eyes, has magnified its feeling to such an extent, that he says, truthfully, that his eyes are "full of dirt."

For several minutes, he rubs them and winks furiously in an effort to get the particles removed.

The liquids of the eye wash most of them out, but two or three stick there, and, smarting having ceased, the man thinks his eyes are clear and clean again.

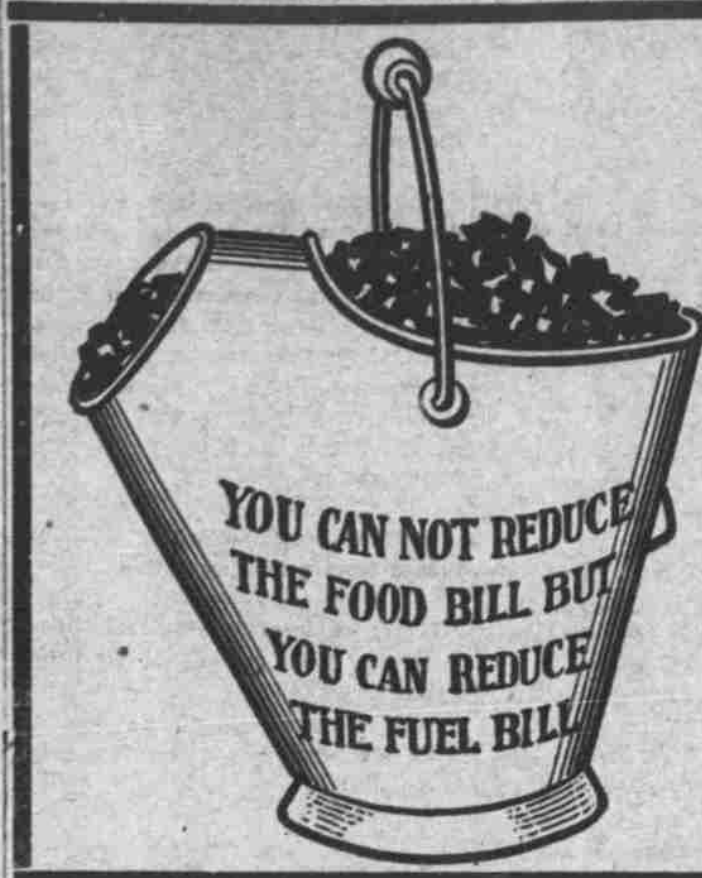
But those few foreign specks are to work a fearful injury. In the course of a few hours they cause a renewed irritation, but they are too firmly lodged to be removed by rubbing.

The irritation grows as the days go by. The conjunctions, or mucous membrane, which lines both eyelids, and covers the external portions of the eyeball, becomes inflamed.

The inflammation, slight at first, gives birth to hundreds of minute sores, on the under part of the eyelids, and covers the external portions of the eye ball, becomes stagg, so that they scratch when the lids are worked up and down.

Minute warts form on the inner portion of the lids, which by this time have become a mass of red, heated, ugly lacerations. The pain increases in intensity.

Let us assume that he caught a bad cold, which is neglected. Catarrh develops and in a short time, the membranes of the eye are swollen. The tiny ulcerations soon develop. They are accompanied by a mucous discharge. The disease which at first appeared at the angles of the lids in isolated patches, and then along the borders of the lids, produces a moist, red surface, and the lashes begin to stick together in little bundles.
