Career of the Republican Nomines For Governor of Ohio.

The Republican nominee for governor of Ohio, Warren G. Harding, is forty-five years old and a native of Obio, having been born in Blooming tain in this way: Drove, Morrow county, on Nov. 2, 1865. Mr. Harding is a newspaper college at Iberia, the college not now

being in existence. He taught school one year and studied law one year and then went into newspaper work.

He was elected to the state senate in 1889 from the counties of Logan, Union, Marion and Hardin, that being his first whirl in politics, and he has been prominent in the politics of the state ever since, serving as lieutenant governor of Ohio under Myron T. Herrick.

During the career of ex-Senator Joseph B. Foraker Mr. Harding was known as an ardent follower and admirer of the senator, but in late years be has not actively allied himself with any faction of the party. He has been mentioned for the governorship a number of times, but has given way to oth ers until now.

Mr. Harding's great-grandfather, George Tyron Harding, got his name from a family connection with one of the colonial governors of Connecticut, and his great-grandmother was Elizabeth Madison, a type of the early Ohio pioneer woman. His grandfath-Charles A. Harding, and his grandother, Mary Crawford Harding, had one son, George Tyron, who is a eticing physician at Marion and faer of Warren G. His mother, who tied recently, was Phoebe Elizabeth Dickerson, descendant of the Dicker Yan Kirk family.

GREAT QUANTITIES OF ALCOHOL SHIPPED IN BOTTLES

"Brand" Changes From Small Print to Attractive Sized Letters

Washington, D. C., Aug. 31-Special -Uncle Sam has just uncovered a patent medicine joke which, if it were not of national import and serious in its pressure on socety in general, would be productive of generous

laughter. Investigators of the Internal Revenue department recently made the startling discovery that 209 medical preparations contain such a high percentage of intoxicating fluid that they they are subject to the liquor tax, although sold for the most part in drug stores.

The list was published July 5th by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue and contains nearly one hundred different kinds of "Bitters", about thirty "Tonics" fifteen "Elixirs", the same number of "Cordials", and a miscellaneous assortment of "Liver and Kidney Cures." "La Grippe Specifics". "Cough Cures" and "Dyspepsia Remedies.'

The law provides that medicinal preparations which contain alcohol must be sufficently "medicated" to render them unfit for use as a beverage. Evidently the nostrum manufacturers are overlooking the "medicinal" portion of their bottled goods. But the law was inexorable and the line '25 per cent alcohol' appeared on various bottles. Every care was, however, taken to have the line appear in as small type as possible. Then a curious change took place. The line '25 per cent alcohol' suddenly appeared in larger type and stuck out prominently on the wrapper. Because the law demanded it? No, the law was the same. The change, curiously enough, came at the same time with the great wave of prohibition throughout the country. To the average mind there would seem to be no special connection here until this significant fact now comes out-that in nearly all the states that have by law recently gone 'dry' the sales of 'patent medincines' having the largest quantitiy of alcohol in them have increased. In three 'dry' states, for example, the sales of one 'patent medicine' with '50 per cent alcohol' prominently printed on the bottle, have increased MORE THAN TENFOLD IN SIX MONTHS. To use the words ofone 'patent medicine' manufacturer, whose nostrum has a generous amount of alcohol in it: These states going dry are all right.' And then he laughed comfortably!
