LAST DAY DRAWS NEAR AGAIN

LINE-UP OF CANDIDATES WILL SOON BE KNOWN.

Special Registration Privileges Provided Friday and Saturday.

REGISTRATION FACTS.

- Books will be down town Friday and Saturday at stipulated hours.
- Registration books close September 13.
- Last day to file nominating petition is September 8th.

Friday during the noon hour La Grande voters will be given another opportunity to register for the coming primaries. County Clerk Ed Wright has promised to have the books at the rooms in the rear of the United States National bank at that hour and all who are not now registered, should stop on their way to lunch and attend to this important matter.

The noon hour, however, will not be the only time for the voters to register down town, for the books will be held there all afternoon until 6 o'clock in the evening, and from 7 until 9 again the same evening.

On Saturday again the books will be open at the same place from 8 a. m. until 1 p. m., and from 2 p. m. until 6 p. m., and from 7 until 9 p. m. Saturday.

Registration closes on September 13, at 5 o'clock, and every man who is not registered, will positively be denied the right to vote at the primaries.

Petitions in September 8th.

It is but a week now until all candidates must have their petitions filed with the county clerk or with the secretary of state as the case may be. While it is possible to run as an independent candidate without being on the ticket as a party candidate, it is presumed that every man who aspires to the candidacy for any office, will go through the primary requirements and file his petition before September 8 at 5 o'clock p. m.
