TRI-STATE SHOOT.

Famous Rifle Range at Sea Girt Is Mecca for Sportsmen

Sea Girt, N. J., Sept. 1.—Sea Girt's rifle range again resounded to the crack of many rifles today when the annual tri-state matches of the New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania state rifle association, were commenced. The competition was opened today with the Columbia trophy match for teams of six representing regiments or similar organizations.

The tournament will continue ten days, the more important events including the Interstate regimental team match for the Briggs trophy, to be shot tomorrow, and the Dryden trophy match for teams of eight, will be shot September 9.

An almost unprecedented number of teams are entered and the camp of the marksmen is an animated and busy scene. The Sea Girt range is the oldest national guard range in the country, and admittedly is one of the best, hundreds of thousands of dollars having been expended upon it by the state of New Jersey. In the opinion of many experts, the local range is better equipped than the Camp Perry range in Ohio, where the national matches were recently held.

Many visitors are here today to witness the contest and thousands are expected during the ten days, the nearness of the range to Asbury Park, Long Branch and other summer resorts enabling visitors to reach Sea Girt easily.
