

Notice of Restoration of Public Lands to Settlement and Entry.

Department of the Interior, General Land Office, Washington, D. C., July 28, 1910.

NEW YORK NEWS AND GOSSIP

New York labor unions are planning the greatest Labor Day celebration and parade in the history of the city for Monday next. Tens of thousands of men, representing the hundreds of organized trades, will be in line and the demonstration will be an imposing illustration of the power of organized toil.

It was twenty-eight years ago that the first Labor Day parade was held in New York, as it was also the first in the country. At that time militant labor unions were viewed with suspicion by many "good" people, who were accustomed to denounce the leaders in such movements as "anarchists" and "dangerous agitators". Except in Battle Creek and Los Angeles, such views are no longer held by any considerable number of people, and the "cranks" who took part in the first observance of Labor Day may feel well repaid for the scorn and contumely heaped upon them at that time.

The first parade started from the city hall, with about a hundred men in line. The little band was greeted with hoots and jeers as it marched up town, but the "agitators" kept doggedly on their way. At Astor place, a large number of laboring men had gathered, with the intention of joining the parade if it reached that far. The addition of these "summer soldiers" and "sunshine patriots" brought the procession up to a respectable size, and the hoots and jeers were succeeded by cheers. From Astor Palace to Union Square, the procession grew constantly longer and at the reviewing stand there were 2,500 men in line. The success of the demonstration was heralded in the newspaper extras, and that afternoon 40,000 men, women and children joined in the picnic of the Central Labor Union.

With the republican party in New York state somewhat split by the Taft-Roosevelt-Sherman-Barnes encounter, the Democrats are beginning to wear the optimistic expression of a cat who hears a mouse. "Harmony" has become the watchword of the Empire State Democracy, with power and preferment and pie as the possible rewards for attaining this beautiful state. To that end, a pow-wow will be held next Thursday at the Knickerbocker hotel, when ways and means of bringing about harmony and "presenting a solid front to the enemy" will be discussed. State Chairman John A. Dix is the leader in the movement. Conservatives and radicals will be urged to try their little axes and forget such principles as are conflicting. In order that a Democratic victory may be brought about.

New York, Sept. 3.—An old fashioned country fair, with prize pigs and pumpkins, harness races, greased pole contests, pink lemonade and Bosco, who eats 'em alive, among other time-honored attractions, will be held next week within the limits of New York City. Nor will it be a burlesque affair, but the real thing, and the spectators will include more men typical of "Uncle Josh" of the rural comedy than could be found at any similar affair in the wilds of Arkansas.

Train service by way of the tube under East River, connecting the Long Island and Pennsylvania railways, will be commenced next week. It will thus become possible for the passenger from points west of New York to reach any point in Long Island, without change or troublesome ferry trips. The Pennsylvania now has tubes under both the East and North rivers, connecting with the magnificent new terminal station in the heart of Manhattan, the finest railroad structure in the world.

New Yorkers who like to run to fires and see the fun and who are possessors of badges permitting them to pass the fire lines, will find themselves deprived of that amusement after next week. So many fire badges have been issued to people who have no business at fires that at any big blaze the excitement seekers seriously impede the work of the firemen. There are now 4,000 such badges out, but they will all be worthless after next Friday, when new badges will be issued only to newspapers, city officials having business within fire lines, and electricians and other employees of traction, telephone, telegraph and similar corporations whose property may require attention during fires.

Persistent criticism by one of the New York newspapers is given as his reason for abandoning the pasteurized milk stations by Nathan Straus, the philanthropist, who gained international fame through his crusade to "save the babies." The seventeen stations established by Mr. Straus for the free distribution of pasteurized milk, will be continued through the present summer, but will not be reopened next year. Soon after Mr. Straus began his work, there was a great decrease in the death rate of infants in the poorer sections of the city, and thousands of children probably owe their lives to the Jewish philanthropist.

Miss Billie Burke is the owner of a calf which she would doubtless be willing to dispose of cheap for cash or any other consideration. The calf was born on board a trans-Atlantic liner, Lawrence D'Orsay, an English actor, engaged for Miss Burke's company, was a passenger on the ship. He has a keen sense of humor of the British brand, so he bought the calf, christened it Billy Burke, and presented the animal to the actress. It was a rippling idea, don't you know, but Miss Burke, it is rumored, would be quite willing to part with the gift, having no particular use for a calf.

The exhibitions is the annual fair of the Richmond county Agricultural Society, and will be held on the grounds at Dongan Hills, Staten Island, beginning Monday. Richmond county is within the corporate limits of Greater New York, although within its confines are stretches of country abounding in bucolic scenes that seem a thousand miles away from Forty-second street and Broadway. The metropolitan "rubes" will attend the fair in force, and mingle with the fashionable folk from the real city to whom the hunt meeting and horse show will be an attraction.

Our distinguished fellow townsman, John D. Rockefeller, is among those invited to go up to Newberg next week to attend a reunion of the Rockefeller clan. The gathering is planned for Friday, and a number of Rockefellers from this city will be on hand. Those invited to the reunion are the lineal descendants of Johann Peter Rockefeller, who came to America in 1723. He is said to have died some years ago. A history of the Rockefeller family has been published and will be distributed at the reunion. It traces the family back to the year 800.
