

WORKMEN AGREE TO END WAR

SPANISH GOVERNMENT HOPEFUL OF QUICK END.

General Strike Throughout the Kingdom is Averted by Unions.

Madrid, Sept. 6.—Voting 78 to 9 against a general strike the labor organization of Madrid today refused to join a movement which was feared would succeed throughout the nation. The determination of the labor unions to remain at work gives the government hope of checking the strike movement in other places without serious rioting. As a result the cabinet today is bending every effort to stop the strike at Barcelona, the revolutionary center. Fresh troops have been ordered there today following outbreaks last night.

Troop Strike Breakers Arrive.

Barcelona, Sept. 5.—Butcher Weyler at the head of 3,000 troops arrived here today in an attempt to break the strike which is stagnating business throughout the city. Several minor riots occurred during the night. Weyler plans to reorganize the garrison and institute an energetic campaign against content strikers who are being reinforced by arrivals from the country.

PAVING AT STANDSTILL.

Breakdown in Mixer Machinery Responsible for Delay Many Hours.

Because of a breakdown in the mixer where bitumen and small rock are thoroughly mixed, no paving was done today. Late this afternoon the twisted shaft which was the cause of the trouble, was replaced by another and the work was resumed after nearly twelve hours' delay.

ELKINS' AFFAIR IS MUDDLED

CONFIDENTIALLY REPORTED ALL AGREEMENTS ARE OFF.

Following Definite Announcement of Marriage, Comes a Denial.

London, Sept. 6.—Efforts of friends of Miss Elkins and Duke De Abruzzi to determine today's status of long-drawn-out international romance, met with the usual failure. Although Paris dailies declare that the marriage will take place next February, a Paris correspondent said the objections to the union by Queen Marguerite and Duchess Aosta were withdrawn last evening.

Preliminary instructions for Miss Elkins' entry into the Roman Catholic church will be started under the direction of Monsignor Boccara, the royal chaplain. The correspondent confidently places her dowry at five millions.

Negotiations Are Off.

A cable from Paris however discounts the reported agreement, as equally good authority, and declares that all negotiations between the families are off. The failure is caused by a statement that the family would assume the Italian court. At any rate the agreements reached early in the week are off for good and the marriage will take place.

COMPANY TESTS NEW COAL

HAS SPECIAL ENGINE BUILT TO BURN IT IN.

If Style of Engine and Grade of Coal Are Satisfactory, More to Come.

A YOUNG GOVERNOR.

Acting Chief Executive of Oregon Only Thirty-four.

Oregon is peculiar in having no lieutenant governor, likewise in having no nominating conventions, at least in theory. Both of these unique facts are connected with Jay Bowerman, acting governor of the state. Nor is this the only distinguishing fact about Mr. Bowerman. Another is that he is only thirty-four years old, perhaps the youngest candidate for governor in the land. He was recently indorsed for

governor by the Republican state assembly, subject to ratification at the primaries.

Jay Bowerman arrived in Marion county without an education or the means to secure it. He engaged himself as a farm hand, his tremendous strength of body making him an ideal wielder of the pitchfork in harvest time. With the earnings of that labor Mr. Bowerman paid for tuition at Willamette university, finally taking up the study of law and being admitted to the bar at Salem when he was twenty years of age.

Mr. Bowerman recently attended the meeting of western governors on conservation.

A Fierce Flame.

The oxygen acetylene blowpipe produces the highest temperature of any flame known as a product of combustion. 6,300 degrees, 1,200 degrees higher than the oxyhydrogen flame and almost as hot as the electric arc.

A Long Wharf.

One of the longest wharves in the world, almost a mile in length, or, to be exact, 4,700 feet, is at Port Los Angeles, Cal. It extends into the Pacific in a long serpentine curve.

Siamese Pottery.

The art of making pottery was introduced into Siam from China in the eleventh century, and the original kilns were located near the ancient city of Swankhaok, and here the work of turning out what is known as Swankhalok ware was apparently continued until the city was destroyed during the Burmese invasions of 1765-1766.

SACRED HEART OPENED.

School Commences With Good Attendance and More Expected Later.

Sacred Heart academy opened its doors for the 1910-1911 school year this morning and though at an early date the attendance was good others will register later in the season when they can more conveniently leave the farms and devote their entire time to school work. The usual commercial musical and art and routine courses will be taught as usual.

Plan to Bond California.

Sacramento, Sept. 6.—For providing legal means for aiding the Panama fair at San Francisco in 1915, the state legislature convened today in special meeting. A constitutional amendment will be offered making it possible for

the state to bond itself for five million dollars to aid the exposition. A charter amendment will be offered so San Francisco can bond itself in the same sum.

Workmen's Congress.

The Hague, Sept. 6.—Extension of social insurance to include not only workmen, but small trades people, shop keepers and farmers, provision for widows and orphans by means of insurance, and insurance against unemployment, are among the subjects to be discussed during the conference opened today by the International Congress on Workmen's Insurance.

The United States is officially represented by Dr. W. H. Tolman, director of the American Museum of Natural History and chairman of the international committee of social insurance.
