Carlism And Progress In Spain

THE straightest tip about the Carlism of Spain is that they never can "come back." They have been trying it for seventy-five years, but with a Jeffries finish all the time. The present representative of the Carlism is Don Jaime, and he is trying to take advantage of the disagreement between the king and the Vatican to manufacture a little side revolution in favor of himself. Don Jaime is too nice and proper a pretender ever to overturn a dynasty. He never gets further than pronouncements.

It was even so with his ancestors. One of them did manage to pull off some kind of an inconsequential revolution, but it never got anywhere. That was the first Don Carlos. Since then the pretenders have been pretenders and nothing more. Even when Spain declared herself a republic for a year and a day the Carlism were entirely inefficient and let the regular reigning house return to power when the republican dream was over. From all indications it will be the same in the present instance. Don Jaime will write letters to his followers—nice, ladylike letters they will be—but Alfonso XIII. will continue to be the real boss around the throne.

The present situation in Spain has several points of interest for Americans aside from the fact that it is a step in the direction of the separation of church and state. One is that General Weyler, of Spanish reconcentrado fame, has figured in it to some extent as a preserver of order. Another is that Cardinal Merry del Val, the man who was charged with having handled the Vatican end of the Roosevelt incident, is also charged by the Spanish

government with having been the man responsible for the break between the holy see and Spain. The third is that King Alfonso's progressiveness, fearlessness and democratic attitude have rather appealed to Americans, and they are taking notice on his account. Then, too, we have felt a sort of magnanimous and friendly concern in all things done by Spain ever since the Spanish-American war.

One of the reasons for the new attitude in the land of the dons is the growth of the labor movement. This cause has worked a change in every European country, and, while it has not so profoundly affected Spain as it has France, Germany and some of the smaller nations, its influence there has been distinctly felt. Moreover, the spirit of modernism, the same spirit that has been felt in Russia and even in Turkey, is present in Spain. The movement for separation of church and state, which won out in Germany and Anglo-Saxon nations centuries ago, is now sweeping through the Latin countries. Italy led the way, France recently followed, and now Spain is falling in line. This is the real meaning of the present Spanish upheaval.

On the crest of this progressive wave Don Jaime flashes as a piece of wreckage. He is a recrudescence, an anachronism, a relic of the past, a royal pretender. He has about as much chance to regain the throne of his ancestors as the various French pretenders have to re-establish monarchy in France. Many things have been at work in Europe during the past few decades, things that have transformed the thought of the nations. Democracy, liberalism, modernism, socialism, the labor cause and a general wave of enlightenment have touched every land and have made at least the beginnings of a new order. Nevertheless if a revolution were to break out in Spain Don Jaime might

become an incident in the struggle, provided he has enough real stamina to project himself into the situation at all. There are many Carlism in Spain, and it is altogether possible that the reactionaries of all shades might be rallied under his banner. In the Basque provinces he is strong, but the Basque provinces are poverty stricken and thinly peopled.

person in ministerial raiment. His face looks like a week of prayer, and he's always "just a little down in the mouth."

His methods of living are peculiar. He goes to the ball yard via street car, climbs the stairs into the grand stand, buys a score card and walks slowly down to the bench.

Arriving at the bench, he removes his coat, draws a pencil from his pocket and makes a few marks on the score card. When the contest starts he sits with hands on his knees, body leaned forward, and wiggles diligently with the score card. Occasionally he shifts his feet, which has great significance for the toiling athlete.

After the game he waits until the crowd leaves the park, climbs on to a street car and goes back to the hotel quietly, with dignity and without a smile.

Mack handles his ball players as a woman teaches the children in primary grades—firmly, kindly and with everlasting patience. His players love him, they work for him and are satisfied. He has shoved a bunch of youths, supported by a few old heads, to the front in the pennant race, and they are out there with a good, comfortable lead.

Cornelius McGillicuddy is a close student, and he developed himself from an ordinary catcher to an astute director of a major league club. He has wisdom in keeping with his serious appearance.
