ELEVENTH SERIES.

(Written by Dr. Dr. M. P. Mendelson, Doctor of Optics, for the benefit of the Public.)

If there is one maxim that should apply to granulated eyelids more than another, it is that time is precious. The membranes that line the organ of sight are so tender that the presence of the slightest foreign substance there may work lasting harm. The conjunction is exceedingly liable to inflammation. In mild cases of granulated lids this inflammation does not seem serious, but it must be remembered that it has but one end, and that is the end which many suffering men have found to their sorrow, and which casts them into gloom and despair until they learned that there is hope for even such as they.

The term "mild form granulation" is misleading. It may seem mild for a time but without the proper treatment it is just as impossible for it to remain mild as it is for an unchecked fire to keep from spreading. There is real danger in granulation from the very moment its first symptoms become manifest.

This disease does not spare infants and it is highly important that the first evidences of it should be attended to immediately in order to avoid the speedy passage of the simple stage, into the for mthat means inevitable wretchedness and disfigurement. Thousands of little children have eyelids which discharge a thick sticky substance that dries upon the margins of the eyelids, and often causes them to stick together.

There is a form of granulation that is contagious. The discharge from the little sores is like hives. The membranes of the eye, are beset with granular, half transparent bodies, which may pass from one person to others in places where they are crowded closely together, or to be transferred by the careless use of towels which others have used.

The malady in such instances seems to be waiting everywhere, looking for a chance to increase and cause widespread injury.

Other things, that may lead to granulated eyelids, are over eating, intemperate drinking, unclean habits, the use of injurious soaps and excesses of any kind.

Wild hairs may lead to the same, unless treatment is restored to and unless that treatment be of the proper kind, one does not know when the disease will fasten itself upon him.

It is such a little thing at first, seemingly such a trifle inconvenience, that serious attention is not paid to it.

So few there are who know how to Count the Cost.

The disease may be contracted on a bright day, when the victim is laughing with nature and the world. Steadily it will carry on its insidious work, working slow ruin while it produces misery and pain, until at last on just as bright a day as the first one, when the patient is no longer able to see the happy world distinctly, or to laugh and be happy with it, he finds that the destruction has reached the crucial limit and that the lamp of vision has been extinguished.
