Egyptians in Protest.

Cairo, Sept. 14—Today, the twenty-seventh anniversary of the entry of the British troops into Cairo was marked by many meetings and demonstrations of protest against the further "wicked occupation of the country" by Great Britain. The National Egyptian Congress issued the call for the public protest and called upon all loyal Egyptians to join in a demand for "freedom from the British yoke." Since former President Roosevelt's visit to Egypt, and his subsequent address on the subject of Egyptian occupation, the Egyptian nationalists have been more than usually active. Banners bearing legends denunciating of Roosevelt and referring to him as a "tyrant" and "foe of freedom" were displayed during the day's demonstrations.

White Plains Horse Show.

White Plains, N. Y., Sept. 14—All of the latest and noblest 1911 models of feminine frippery, from hats to shoes, are on display at the seventeenth annual Westchester Horse Show, opened here today. Society folk from Baltimore to Boston, but with New Yorkers predominating, have been attracted to this ancient village by the equine exhibition and the opportunity to display the newest fall and winter creations of the modistes.

The prize list—for the horses, not the ladies—is by far the richest in the history of the White Plains exhibitions. Among those who offer trophies are Oliver Harriman, W. H. Moore, Adrian Iselin, Jr., John D. Archbold, H. R. M. Coles, Henry S. Bowen, J. Rich Steers and William E. Iselin. There are entries in sixty-nine classes. The show will continue four days, with a large and varied program of events.

Notice is hereby given that sealed proposals will be received by the Mayor and City Council of the City of La Grande, Oregon, until Wednesday.

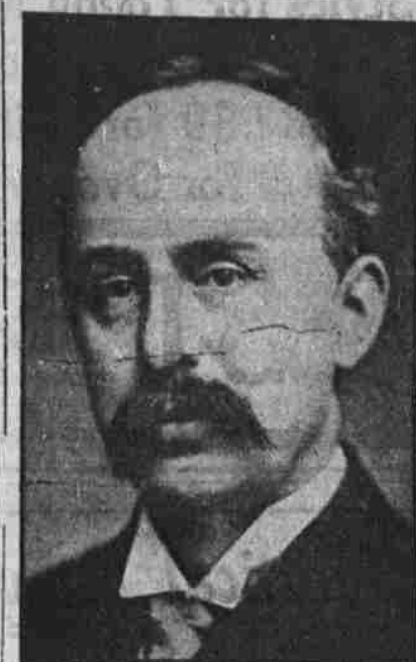
