### PROVIDE WAYS AND MEANS.

#### New Packing Plant at Spokane Means Better Hog Markets.

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 15.—Special—Directors of experimental stations in Montana, Oregon, Idaho and Washington and officials of railroads and experts from other states will meet in the rooms of the Spokane chamber of commerce on October 4 to discuss ways and means of interesting ranchers and farmers in raising more hogs for the markets in the Northwestern states.

It is expected that this source of revenue will add millions of dollars yearly to the wealth productions of the four states and keep at home hundreds of thousands of dollars, now sent to middle western states for pork products. Keen interest is centered in the movement in various parts of the northwest, especially in packing house centers, and it is likely that concerted action will follow the session in Spokane.

The opening of the E. H. Stanton Packing company's plant in Spokane, with a capacity of 1500 hogs a day, early in October, means that at least 300,000 hogs will be required in the local abattoir yearly, and if these cannot be had in the country the firm will have to import them from the other states. This is probably true of houses in other parts of the country.

"The purpose of the meeting of the directors of the experimental station in the four states is to outline a plan of action," said Edwin A. Smith, a member of a special committee of the Day Farming congress, which has the matter in hand. "We expect to impress upon these educators in things agricultural the importance of the hog industry, and through them interest our farmers."

"It is proposed to have the stations issue circulars and pamphlets showing what can be accomplished in growing hogs for the market and give such other data as is required by the farmers."

#### SHOWS A GOOD BUSINESS.

Wallowa, Oregon, Sept. 15.—Special—One of the best indications that this city is coming to the front in a

business is the last statement of the Stock Growers' and Farmers' Bank. With a capital stock of \$50,000 it has over \$200,000 on deposit and carries a loan account of about \$100,000. At times this bank has some heavy borrowers but they are always either stock or lumber men and loans are for short time. Few towns the size of Wallowa can make a better showing according to the opinion of local people.
