F. H. Green Succeeds Geo. H. Currey As Superintendent of S. S.

The Methodist Sunday school held its annual election of officers Sunday. F. H. Green takes the place of Geo. H. Currey, who refused re-election on account of having held the office so long. He was named as assistant.

E. W. Kammerer is treasurer to succeed himself, and Miss Pauline Newton is continued as organist. Most of the teachers were retained as formerly.

Noted Irishmen in Buffalo.

Buffalo, N. Y., Sept. 26—What promises to be the most representative meeting in the history of the Irish national movement in America was inaugurated today with the arrival of hundreds of Irishmen from all over the United States and Canada to take part in the session of the United Irish League of America. Four distinguished members of the British parliament, John Redmond, chairman of the Irish parliamentary party; T. P. O'Connor, Joseph Devlin and Daniel Boyle, are here to address the convention. The Buffalo gathering will be followed by a series of meetings throughout this country and Canada, to be addressed by the famous ambassadors from Ireland. Today was devoted to the reception of the visitors and a meeting of the executive committee. A smoker will be held this evening, and the

meeting will formally convene tomorrow.

National Irrigation Congress.

Pueblo, Colo., Sept. 26—With the fourfold object of saving the forests, storing the floods, reclaiming the desert and making homes on the land, the eighteenth National Irrigation congress was formally opened in Pueblo today. Mexico, Canada and several central and eastern states, as well as all the states of the west, are represented at the great gathering of practical conservationists.

Reclamation projects under the Carey act are to be considered by the various problems connected with the reclamation of the "great American desert" will be discussed by experts connected with government bureaus, state commissions, agricultural and forestry organizations and institutions of learning. A great exhibition illustrating irrigation methods and displaying products of irrigation methods is being held in connection with the convention.

Nearly a dozen cities are competing for the honor of entertaining the 1911 and Oakland, Cal., Kansas 78903

congress, including San Francisco, and Oakland, Cal., Chicago, Kansas City, St. Joseph and St. Louis, Mo., Charleston, S. C., and several Texas cities.

Kammerer Barred.

William Kammerer was born in Upper Saxony, Germany, in 1837. March 5. He came to America in 1847 and landed at Milwaukee, Wis., when that mighty city was but a fort of twelve block houses. In 1868 he married Miss Katrina Webber to which age-long and happy union were born five children, of which three survive. Aaron D., Edward W., and Ella Zweifel. The last two reside in La Grande.

The bereaved wife still lives. Many years ago Mr. Kammerer connected himself with the German Evangelical church and for some years was an effective local preacher in it. He had resided in Oregon twenty years, and seven in La Grande till the date of his death, Sept. 24, 1910.
