REVISED TARIFF SHEETS OUT

PASSENGER CHARGES BASED ON A REVISION SURVEY.

Railroad News of General Interest in and Around La Grande.

New passenger tariffs, compiled on automatic surveys are in the hands of Local Agent Keeney and becomes effective, intrastate, October 1 and interstate November 1. The new tariffs are based on accurate surveys and henceforth there will be no guess work in compiling them. The prevailing system in banking circles of fractional divisions will be adhered to. When, for instance, the mileage between stations is ten and four-fifths miles, the passenger gets the benefit and the company charges for ten miles. On the half mile, the company takes the additional fraction.

This revision has made a difference of five cents between Joseph and Portland. These revisions followed a recent survey of the entire Oregon Navigation company lines.

BIGGEST STOCK TRAIN HAULED.

Eighteen Cars of Sheep and Stock Hauled out of Wallowa county.

Setting a new mark for size of one stock train out of Wallowa, Conductor Grady brought in eighteen cars of stock and sheep last week from Wallowa county. This is the largest shipment on one regular train that has ever been hauled out of that fertile corner of Oregon and shows the rapid growth of that industry since the steel rails made shipments easy. The entire consignment was headed for Portland.

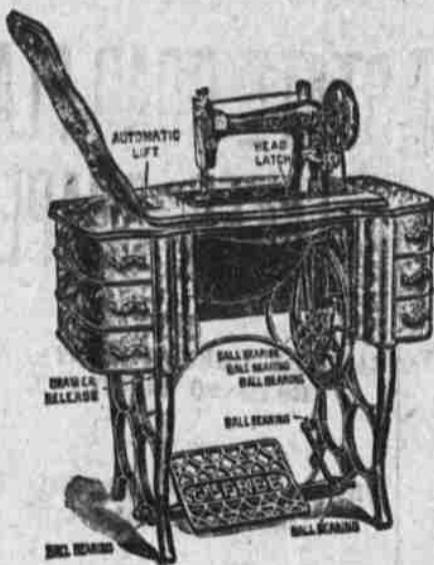
