PRESENT WALKS IN DEPLORABLE CONDITION IN PLACES.

Entire Streets to be Included in Repairs to be Ordered Tonight.

Over three miles of cement walks will be ordered in resolutions that are to be introduced at tonight's council meeting. Some time ago a resolution was passed forbidding construction of wooden sidewalks in a specified district, and since that time, the walks have been allowed to deteriorate to such an extent that in many places they are in a frightfully bad condition. At various places, it is true, they have been repaired with cement, but entire streets are not systematically improved. As there are pieces of walks in both the main and north sections of the city that positively have to be repaired at once to insure safety to pedestrians, the street committee of the council was ordered to determine where the repairs were necessary and report tonight. This will be done with resolutions asking for cement walks.

Cement Walks Cheap.

There is a trifle difference in the cost of cement and board walks. It costs approximately thirteen cen's per running foot to construct a good board walk, and it is the belief of the street committee that this large batch of work can be contracted for 17 cents. Consequently the difference is very small.

REACH 2,000,000 BOXES.

Orient and Europe Again.

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 28-Northwest apple growers will have plenty of money to invest in automobiles, pianos anud similar little trinkets this winter, with a bumper yield, the orchardists offered good prices for their crops, owing to the shortage in other apple sections. It is estimated that the apple growers of this state alone will realize some \$14,000,000 and the growers in Oregon, northern California, Idaho and Montana will also roll

The yield in Washington is estimated at about 4,000,000 boxes, nearly double that of last year. The Oregon crop will be about half of that of Washington, or in the neighborhood of 2,000 boxes.

For three months past buyers from New York, Chicago, Boston, St. Louis and other great cities, and from London, Paris and Berlin, have been competing for the crop and more than half of the apples grown in the nor hwest have been sold. Growers who can afford to do so, however, are holding their fruit in expectation of big prices in December, when the holiday season will cause an increased demand The average wholesale price this year will probably be 25 per cent. higher than last year, with a corresponding increase to the consumer.

Many large consignments of extra choice fruit will go to England, Australia, South America, China, Japan Germany, France and Italy, The eastern and middle states will likely get less than half of the Northwestern crop, and, with a shortage in those sections, the easterners will probably find apples a luxury this winter. Many of the extra choice apples for export will be packed in boxes with cardboard layers, similar to egg cases, in order to protect the valuable fruit from damage in transit.
