Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Common Council of the City of La Grande, Oregon, on the 18th day of March, 1910, creating Improvement District No. 22 and designating N. Ash street, as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said Common Council on the 18th day of April, 1910, whereby said Council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of N. Ash street, in said improvement district as hereinafter described by laying thereon board walk, the council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made; that the boundaries of said district to be

so improved are as follows: All that portion of N. Ash street, from the North side of Jackson avenue, to the north side of Benton avenue. Notice is hereby further given that the Council will levy a special assessment on the property affected and benefited by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$462.40. That the Council will on the 5th day of October, 1910, meet at the Council chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. to consider said estimated cost, and the levy of said assessment, when a hearing will be granted to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment.
