ATTENDANCE AT U OF O LARGE

REGISTRATIONS ALREADY FAR PAST RECORDS.

Interesting Letter from State Institution at Eugene by a Student.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Ore., Oct. 4—Special—All previous records for enrollment at the state university are surpassed in this year's attendance. Up to date registrations number 625, exclusive of the law and medicine departments which would increase it to about 1100 and students are still coming in from all parts of the state. Four new professors and twice as many assistants have been added to the faculty and all available class, lecture and laboratory rooms have been called into use. All classes are crowded and the present outlook points to an exceptionally fine year for Oregon.

Student activities have started with a rush. The college paper, published by students semi-weekly, has already printed three issues since college opened on the 20th. Glee Club began practice Monday evening. Coach Warner and 45 candidates for the football team, including six old veterans, have been hard at work for two weeks, and Captain Hawkins and Trainer Hayward have recruited about twenty-five track men who are busily engaged each evening in preparation for the spring track work. Soccer or association football is also being played at Oregon this year, in order that the scope of fall athletics may be enlarged and include those who are too light for football or not particularly adept on the track. Last this should give the impression that Oregon is becoming an athletic institution, rather than one of learning, it might be added, parenthetically, that all athletic contestants in all departments this year will be required to have a grade of C, (80 per cent) or forfeit all rights to participate in either games or tryouts. President Campbell is the instigator of this move. He believes the best athlete should be the best student, and also that all students should participate in some form of exercise.

Going back to football, which is the big point of interest among the student body members, Coach Warner, the 250 pound giant from Cornell, is making good in every way, and developing a team of speedy, gritty players that will hold their own anywhere in the northwest. The punting question, which has been a great worry to Coach Warner, since Clark was graduated last spring has been solved in the person of Carl Funston of Dallas, Oregon. Although a new man at football, he is a find at kicking, and boots the ball 50 and 60 yards regularly. Next to Fenton, probably Hall of Baker City is making the best showing. He is a big six-foot line-man, with lots of fight and plenty of speed and durability. Coach Warner has kept Hall on the first squad since selecting the probable first team. Other good men among the newcomers are McCully, of the Denver School of Mines, Fay and Colb of Portland. The old men in the squad are Capt. Taylor, Lataurette, Main, Michael, Bailey, Chandler and Kellogg a former Baker
