Receiver of Local Land Office Buys Residence in East La Grande.

One of the finest and newest cottages in the city has changed hands this week when Colon R. Eberhard purchased the Fred Holm residence on N and 8th streets through the Geo. Currey Realty agency. The purchase price was \$3500 which includes an extra large lot and the cottage which was recently made modern throughout by extensive repairs. Mr. Holm, the former owner has moved to Seattle, some time ago, and sold the property which he had intended to make his home only because of change of location.

Mr. Eberhard, the buyer, indicates his faith in La Grande by making the purchase at this figure. He takes possession about November first.
