England Sends Protection.
London, Oct. 5—Three warships are enroute to Lisbon today to protect the British interests in Portugal, according to an exchange of telegrams. It is unknown whether the commanders of the warships have orders to protect Portugal and the royal family.

King Is Safe on Ship.

Paris, Oct. 5—King Manuel of Portugal is safe aboard the Brazilian warship Sac Palola, which arrived at Lisbon yesterday with President Elect of Brazil, Dr. Marshall De Fozzosa.

Valor Saves King's Life.

If the king has escaped he owes his life to the valor of his body guard. Refugees assert the guard barricaded the entrances to the palace and prevented the capture of the king by withstanding an army many times stronger. During the bombardment Manuel was led through a secret entrance and thus escaped. Then the guard fled.

Bloody Fighting Under Way.

San Sebastian Spain, Oct. 5—Officers of the northern army corps are reported to have received a telegraphic order to prepare immediately for active service. The order indicates Spanish officials had advance information of the Portuguese insurrection and are preparing to put down a like rebellion in Spain by the most drastic measures. Couriers from Portugal assert bloody fighting is already started, in provinces among royalists and revolutionary followers.

England Will Intervene.

London, Oct. 5—A report is generally credited that England will intervene in Portugal. It is understood that there is a compact between the two countries whereby England is given free hand in Portugal in just such a crisis as this.

Government circles are greatly aroused over the possibility of a civil war sweeping Portugal. Rioters, designated as revolutionists, sacked the homes of the government officials and slaughtered the inmates. They fired the dwellings according to late reports.

Clericals and loyalists are fleeing from the city. Government stores have been raided and ammunition seized. The royal palace is partially wrecked. Trains were unable to enter the city and Portuguese warships won't allow foreign vessels to enter. It is reported the king was transferred to a British warship and is now enroute to England.

Siren Caused King's Downfall.

Berlin, Oct. 5—The downfall of King Emanuel and his loss of the throne was caused by a woman, Mlle. Caby de Lisa, a French dancer, according to a story told by high government officials here today.

Advises from the German embassy are to the effect that the king flaunted the woman in the face of his followers, heaped jewels worth fully a million so lavishly as to almost drain the Portuguese treasury. According to the story he made no pretensions of concealing his relations with her. He lodged her at the palace and she accompanied him everywhere. King Manuel frequented Paris and spent much time in the underworld where it is said, he met Liza according to reports.

Russian in Spokane Congress.

Spokane, Wash., Oct. 5—Dr. Theo. Kryshstofvitch, assigned by the ministry of agriculture of Russia as a commissioner to study farm conditions in the United States, has come to Spokane to represent his country at the fifth Dry Farming Congress at the close of which he will visit the grain and hay belts of the northwestern and Pacific states. He expects to pass several weeks in Washington, Oregon, California, Utah, Idaho, Montana and the Dakotas to study the growing of cereals, alfalfa and fruits and root crops.

"I came to Spokane direct from Bue-

nos, Ayres, making only a brief stop at St. Louis," he said. "I passed some time in Argentina, where I was sent on a special mission by my government. There I studied the methods of the farmers with a view to introducing some of them in our country. I also expect to find much useful material in this country. I have read in reports that your farmers are doing wonderful things on so-called dry and irrigated lands and I expect to learn much that will be of value to Russia."

"More than 12,000,000 acres of lands in Argentina are in alfalfa as against between 7,000,000 and 8,000,000 acres in this country. They would raise more of this feed in Argentina were it not for the shortage of seed, which they are now getting from France, Spain, Russia-Turkestan and Persia. Alfalfa is a paying crop."

OLD FAMILIES.

Some in Europe and in the Orient That Are Really Ancient.

In Great Britain and on the continent those families pride themselves that count their ancestry through ten generations, but their claims to really ancient lineage seem insignificant when compared with those of certain houses in the Orient.

We read that the oldest family in Great Britain, the Mar family in Scotland, may trace its pedigree to 1063. Then, too, we have the Campbells of Argyll, whose date is put down at 1190. The Grosvenor family, that of the Duke of Westminster, refers its origin to the same year that the Conqueror "came over"—i. e., 1066. The Austrian house of Hapsburg goes back farther than that, its date being 952, while the Bourbons proudly mention 864 as the date of their origin.

But none of them is to be mentioned in the same breath with the emperor of Japan, whose office has been filled by members of his family for a period of over 2,500 years, the present ruler being the one hundred and twenty second in the line. The first emperor of Japan sat on the throne about the time when Nebuchadnezzar was flourishing—that is, in 650 B. C.

Another oriental branch, the descendants of Mohammed, presents claims not to be dismissed. The prophet was born in 570, and a list of his descendants has been carefully retained, being duly set forth in a volume kept in Mecca. Little or no doubt exists of the authenticity of the long list of names of Mohammed's descendants as registered in this sacred book.—Harper's Weekly.

Government Land.

The land owned by the United States government exceeds in area the region east of the Alleghenies, enough to make two states like Texas, twelve like New York and fifty like Massachusetts.

Related Antiquities.

Striking resemblance has been pointed out between the remarkable ancient ruins at Zimbabwe, in Rhodesia, and antiquities in Cornwall, England.

Governed by Ancestors.
The Gamos of South Africa believe that their ancestors, whose wishes are interpreted by the sorcerers, direct and govern every act of the people. They find auguries, too, in the flight of birds, particularly in the night hawk and the eagle, the writhing of the serpents, the timidity of the mole, the changing colors of the chameleon, the barking or actions of dogs and foxes and even the circumstance of a peat of flies. If a native shudders involuntarily the act is regarded as a sign that some misfortune is about to befall him.

Wheat.

Wheat is the chief basis of the national nourishment of Englishmen, Frenchmen, Spaniards, south Italians—in north Italy maize takes precedence—and Hungarians, and it holds complete supremacy in North America and Australia. In German speaking central Europe wheat has a large consumption, but not to the extent that it is used in the lands named. The principal food is rye bread, not because of the poverty of the people, but because its taste is better liked. In Russia rye bread has a decided lead.

A Question of Identity.

A question in a recent examination on "The Merchant of Venice" was:

"Give three reasons why Shylock hated Antonio."

One little girl wrote as one of her reasons:

"Shylock hated Antonio because he was a Republican."

The teacher was puzzled. Where could the child have got that idea? Then she remembered that Shylock once said of Antonio, "How like a fawning publican he looks!"—National Monthly.

"Goodmen" and "Goodwomen."

A pleasing form of address that was common in the seventeenth century has gone quite out of use, probably because of its restriction to "inferior persons." The "Mr." was then a prefix to which only gentlemen were entitled, and among the puritan fathers of New England the deprivation of the right to be so addressed was indicated as a punishment. "Goodman" or "Goodwoman" by contraction "Gandy" was the address of those low in the social scale. The term is preserved in the names of some of the streets in London.
