LEGAL ENTANGLEMENTS HOWEVER MARK ITS COMPLETION.

Gravity System Done, Meaning Good Supply When it is Finished.

Joseph, Ore., Oct. 11 (Special)—The new gravity water system installed by the city is now ready for use and there is considerable pride expressed over its completion. The intake of the system is below the surface of Wallowa Lake and the fall is about 200 feet to the city, making a splendid pressure. There has been some trouble over the building of this system due to the fact that the Joseph Water Works company believed it had rights that could not be canceled, and as a result the case will be heard in the supreme court in November on the matter. Attorney T. H. Crawford of La Grande and John P. Rusk of Joseph are attorneys for the water works company.
